## WORTH ASSIZES.

## ROSEDALE BRIDGE AGAIN.

Austin W. Clemens Makes the Fatal Leap.

## A PRESTON BOOKKEEPER.

Had Come to Toronto for Consultation as to His Mental Condition.

Victim Had Been Forced to Give Up His Position Owing to Ill-Health.

Had Also Broken Off His Marriage Engagement—Assaulted for the Location of the Outside Bridge—Death Was Instantaneous and Many Bones Broken.

Austin W. Clemens, 22 years of age, a bookkeeper from Toronto, Ont., jumped from the notorious Rosedale bridge yesterday at 1 o'clock and killed himself.

The deceased, with his mother and sister, came to Toronto Thursday evening for the purpose of consulting Dr. Charles O. Preston, an Asylum relative to his mental condition. They were stopping with a relative, Conductor Anderson, 20 Beaconsfield-avenue.

Clemens was employed by the Preston firm, and was forced to give up his position through ill-health. His engagement with a young lady was also broken off. His troubles threw him into a state of despondency and melancholy, from which it was impossible to rouse him. It was on this account that he came to Toronto to consult Dr. Charles O. Preston.

Young Clemens left Mr. Anderson's house before breakfast on Friday morning, and as he had not returned at noon, his relatives became anxious and called on him. J. O. O'Connell, who was with him, had a few weeks. He had not called on the doctor, and his new day had not been what was to be expected.

About 1 o'clock Clemens met a man named Smith, who is employed at 581 Jarvis-street, and asked him the location of the bridge, which others had jumped from. The only one who saw him take the fatal leap was Smith, who saw him jump from the bridge, and saw him fall into the water. He saw him strike his head on the rocks, and saw him die.

The body was taken to the Morgue, and was released from imprisonment at 12:30 p.m. to-day. He will be buried at the Rosedale cemetery.
