Below is given a copy of one of the clauses, the reading of which was the signal for much comment:

That time and again, and more especially recently by certain employers of labor in the city of Hamilton, and by the Grand Trunk Railway Company, alien workmen in large, though varying numbers, have been engaged under contract, and imported into Canada from the United States, contrary to, and in open defiance of the Act of 1897 already quoted, to the manifestly great injury to the working people of this country, in whose interest, and for whose protection the said law was ostensibly enacted.

Delegate William Joyce read the report of the Municipal Committee, which dealt almost wholly with the Board of Control's slashing of the estimates. The committee in their report agreed with the cutting of the amounts off the estimates for police, fall and law expenses, but they did not like the way the controllers treated the Works Department appropriations. They thought it is better to repair roadway than pay law expenses.
