if he likes what is called a Zeugniss, or book of recommendation, and most of them consider it important. The law requires that an employer upon discharging a servant shall write in his book the reasons therefor, and when a servant voluntarily leaves a place of employment, or who has the right to call upon the employer for a "character," as the Irish servant girls say, he can write a Zeugniss.

Where people are employed by the month they are entitled to a month's notice or a month's wages on discharge, and on the other hand must give the same notice if they intend to leave. An ordinary laborer will earn from 20 to 50 cents a day, a mechanic from 50 cents to \$1 a day, and a household servant is entitled to a month's notice or a month's wages on discharge, and on the other hand must give the same notice if they intend to leave.

Household servants in Germany are usually found at employment agencies, where the methods used are very similar to those with which the householders in the United States are familiar. But here, when a servant is engaged, she is offered what is called "hand money"—anywhere from \$5 to \$10, according to circumstance.

The Yaguis raided the ranch, stealing the horses and corn. They visited several other ranches, and almost every day during the past week they have been attacking the ranches along the river are almost deserted.

BAZOUKS WANT THEIR PAY. Constantinople, Oct. 31.—A mutinous demonstration was made in front of the Admiralty Office Tuesday by 800 officers and non-commissioned Bash-Bazouks, which caused dismay among the occupants of the Yildiz Palace.

PAPAL NUNCIO FOR THE HAGUE. London, Oct. 31.—According to the Brussels correspondent of the Times, diplomatic relations between Holland and the Vatican, which were interrupted by the exclusion of the representative of the Pope from the Hague Peace Conference, are about to be resumed by the appointment of a new Papal Nuncio at the Hague.

Boy Charged With Assault. St. Thomas, Oct. 31.—A 15-year-old boy named Frank Demmon, was arrested last night by County Constable John Hopkins, on a charge of assault. He has been living with Dan Sheehan, South Yarmouth. It is alleged that he struck and assaulted Mrs. Sheehan, who is an old lady. The trial was fixed for this afternoon before Squire McCausland.

Named Infant For Assassin. Ottawa, Kan., Oct. 31.—A story reaches here from Warden, a small town northwest of here, of a farmer who named his infant son Leon Czolgosz, and was driven from the neighborhood by other residents of the neighborhood.

Injured Doing Well. New York, Oct. 31.—The man hurt in the collision between Henry Fountain's automobile and an engine on the Long Island City Railroad at Westbury yesterday, who are being cared for in the Mineola Hospital, were reported to be doing well. All will recover. The most seriously injured is N. B. Fullerton, special agent of the Long Island Railroad. He was badly cut about the head and face and sustained a compound fracture of the right leg, but the physicians say there is now no doubt that he will get well.
