This authority is not clear, and has seldom been exercised. By a strict construction of the law the common council of a municipality, or "the highest authority," which is very indefinite, for he may be the burgomaster or the governor, may, in his judgment, summon the parties to labor disputes to appear before the industrial courts on a certain day and submit the points in con-troversy; and it is inferred, altho the law is ambiguous, that the court is to de-cide according to the evidence submitted. if either party objects to the personnel of the court a board of arbitration may be selected in the usual way to settle that

particular case. The industrial courts have received greater attention of late because of the labor disputes concerning wages and hours, which they have been called upon to settle, and have generally been able to arrange compromises.
