Thomas Fox Killed in a Strange Manner at Don Valley Brick Company's Yards.

Thomas Fox, a laborer, was instantly killed yesterday afternoon while at work in the Don Valley Brick Company's yards at Tomdorden.

Two Trains Try to Get on the Same Switch—Two Engineers and a Conductor, All From St. Thomas, Lose Their Lives—Other Fatalities Yesterday.

St. Thomas, March 28.—A fatal accident took place on the loop line of the Grand Trunk Railway at Jarvis about 7 o'clock this morning, resulting in the death of two engine-drivers and one conductor.

The names of the dead are: John Charleton and James McGill, drivers, and Frederick McDonald, conductor, all of St. Thomas.

The westbound train, in charge of Engineer McGill and Conductor McDonald, went thru Jarvis, and was backing down a switch when the second freight, in charge of Engineer Charleton, crashed into it.

The remains of Charleton and McGill were brought here to-night, and conveyed to P. R. Williams' undertaking rooms, where an inquest will be held to-morrow.

Engineer John Charleton lived at 122 Inkerman-street, Engineer James McGill on Scott-street and Conductor Frederick McDonald at 25 Catherine-street. McGill and McDonald are each survived by a widow and two children.
