11,972 Voters in City of London City Clerk Baker Compiles List

Very Large Numbers of Those in the Book Are Freeholders.

City Clerk Baker has compiled Ast showing the number of voters on the city lists, and the different classes There are 2,756 who may vote on both will, and in a short time every piece for them.

In Ward 1 there are 2,124 voters eligible to vote in municipal and other elections, and 736 eligible to vote on holders, 528 women and 395 eligible municipal elections only, a total of to vote for school trustees only.

There are 1,510 freeholders, who are entitled to vote on money bylaws and there are 435 women; 410 are eligible to vote for school trustees only. Ward Two.

In Ward 2, 164 may vote on both elections. municipal and other elections, and 640 may vote in municipal elections only, a total of 2.284.

There are 1,117 freeholders, 394 women voters, and 430 persons eligible Ward Three.

In Ward 3, 2.575 are on the lists to vote for all elections, 715 for municipal only, a total of 3,290. There are 1.762 freeholders, who may vote on money bylaws, 450 women, and 380 who may vote for school trustees, only.
