

# LETTER CARRIERS WHO STAY ON STRIKE TO BE RELEASED

Government Authorizes Post Masters To Discharge the "Posties" Who Refuse To Acknowledge the Settlement Made—Union Men in Vancouver May Go Out in Sympathetic Strike Because of Carriers' Attitude There.

**Government Shows Teeth**  
OTTAWA, July 26.—Following a lengthy sitting of the cabinet this afternoon a statement was given out regarding the salaries paid to letter-carriers, porters, messengers, and mail clerks employed by the Government.  
Hon. C. J. Doherty, acting prime minister, stated that instructions had been issued to postmasters to discontinue the services of those men who refused to return to work. The statement issued this evening follows:  
"The real facts regarding the salary of letter-carriers, porters, messengers, and mail transfer clerks, are as follows:  
"When any one of these officials enters the service, he receives a salary of \$2 per day for the first year, \$2.25 for the second year, \$2.50 for the third year, \$2.75 for the fourth year, and \$3 per day thereafter."  
2,152 Letter-Carriers.  
"There are in the whole of Canada 2,152 letter-carriers, of whom 102 are in the \$2 per day class; 42 in the \$2.25 class; 142 in the \$2.50 class, and 1,866 in the \$3 class.  
"Of porters there are 324, divided as follows:  
"Thirty-nine in the \$2 class; 31 in the \$2.25 class; 30 in the \$2.50 class, and 264 in the \$3 class.  
"Of messengers, there is a total of 44, divided as follows: Two in the \$2 class; 1 in the \$2.25 class; 1 in the \$2.50 class, and 40 in the \$3 class.  
"Of mail transfer clerks, there are 137, divided as follows: 2 in the \$2 class; 1 in the \$2.25 class; 15 in the \$2.50 class; 17 in the \$2.75 class, and 107 in the \$3 class.  
"It will thus be seen that out of a total of 2,557 of these officials, 2,277 are in the maximum class, and only 280 are in the lower classes.  
"In all portions of Canada, west of the St. Lawrence, the officials in the minimum class receive a salary of \$2, and those in the maximum class receive a salary of \$3.  
"The figures must be added the following sums: \$100 bonus voted and paid in 1917, which is included in the estimates voted by parliament, and is now being paid for 1918; \$150 bonus voted for 1918, and \$180 which has for many years been paid these officials west of the St. Lawrence, thus making a total remuneration in money to the men of the minimum class \$1,050, and to men in the maximum class \$1,369.  
"Clothing and Carfare.  
"To this must be added a sum of uniforms consisting of suit, great coat, hat, cap, boots, shoes and raincoats, which may be fairly estimated at \$100 and which was admitted by the representatives of the men before the Government."

**Westerners Are Defiant**  
VANCOUVER, July 26.—Labor circles here are discussing the possibility of a sympathetic strike by the trades and labor council in connection with the postal strike.  
A meeting of the council has been called for Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock, and it is expected that the trades and labor council will take action to support the postal workers.  
The postal service in New Westminster has been stopped again. The letter-carriers and clerks in that city returned to work yesterday, but at 10 o'clock this morning they walked out, and the postal service was again interrupted.  
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**Britain Loses Armed Cruiser to Hun U-Boat**  
LONDON, July 26.—The British armed cruiser Marmora was torpedoed and sunk by a German submarine Tuesday, according to an announcement made by the British admiralty. Ten members of the crew of the vessel are missing, and it is presumed they were killed.  
The admiralty also announces that a British torpedo boat destroyer, the Ashmore, was sunk Monday, and that a crew of seven were missing, and it is presumed they were drowned.  
Naval records contain no cruiser named the Marmora, and it is possible the vessel sunk was the Penelope, an armed merchant cruiser, of the Royal Canadian Navy, which was built at Belfast in 1913, was 530 feet long, and had a beam of 60 feet.  
A statement issued today by the admiralty says that 100,000 men, representing the British Empire, are now in the hands of the enemy, and that the women and other skilled workers were strongly opposed to the strike.  
Lloyd George Threatens.

The statement pointed out that certain workers had quit their jobs in disregard of the advice of the union advisory committee.  
"They have ceased work," the statement said, "not in pursuance of trade disputes, but in an endeavor to force the Government to change a national policy essential to the winning of the war."  
While millions of their fellow-countrymen hourly are facing danger and death for their country, the men on strike have been granted exemptions from these perils only because their services are considered of more value to the state in the workshops than in the army.  
The decision of the conference of members of engineering and allied trades at Leeds yesterday, when it was voted to cease work next Tuesday, if the employer failed to accede to their demands, was carried by a very narrow majority after heated discussion.  
Defiance to Government.  
The action of the conference, at which delegates representing 300,000 workers were present, amounts to defiance of the Government's announcement that it will revoke the certificates of workers which exempt them from military duty.  
A large number of men throughout the country are against the strike, and earnestly hope for a settlement before the threat is executed on Tuesday, but a majority may act on the decision of the Leeds conference.  
Telegrams to that effect have been received from Lincoln, Nottingham, Derby, Barrow and other centres. Meanwhile the labor leaders are exerting their influence to prevent a stoppage of work, which at the present juncture of the campaign in France, would be considered most serious.

**REMAIN OUT IN CALGARY.**  
CALGARY, July 26.—The postoffice employees met today and reaffirmed their decision to remain out until a board of conciliation was appointed. The board of trade also met and passed a resolution calling upon the Government to effect a settlement, as business was being paralyzed by the conditions. The local Great War Veterans met, too, and passed a resolution demanding a conciliation board for the postal employees. They have sent this message to the Government and to the Great War Veterans' convention now assembling in Toronto.

**BOLSHEVIKI ARE LINING UP WITH THE ARCH ENEMY**  
Berlin Engineering Another Campaign to Engage Allies.

LONDON, July 26.—Reports from Russia indicate that the Bolsheviks are preparing to line up with Germany. Berlin is trying to lure Russia and the Allies into armed conflict as a means of staving off defeat and disaster on the western front.

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# MUNITION STRIKERS WEAKENED WHEN TOLD TO WORK OR FIGHT

Lloyd George's Ultimatum Is Having Desired Effect.

GET NO STRIKE PAY  
Several Unions at Coventry and Birmingham Refused to Tie Up Plants There.

LONDON, July 27.—The announcement last night of Premier Lloyd George that all workmen absent from factories on or after Monday will be deemed to be voluntarily placed themselves outside the munitions industry, and that they will become liable to reach the bulk of the strikers last night. Consequently, it was generally known in the strike areas. It was, however, communicated to the strike leaders at whom the leaders declared they were confident that the strikers would not be intimidated or driven to resume work by the Government's threat. The leaders added that such a possibility had been considered fully beforehand.  
No reports reached London last night of an extension of the strike, and the great bulk of the workers still remain unaffected. Such apparent centres as London, Manchester, Leeds, Nottingham and Huddersfield, for instance, remain cool.

**Situation Still Grave.**  
Morning newspapers here comment on the Government's announcement mostly with approval, although they recognize the situation is a grave one, and contend that it will be generally endorsed by the country. The country's need is manifest by some papers, which, while admitting that a strike at the present time is a grave one, think that the Government might have been reached by a discussion and a compromise.  
The Daily News, which regards the Government's decision as the gravest taken in the history of British industrial disputes, says the responsibility for the results must rest entirely on the Government. It adds that it is difficult to believe that a suspension of the emergency for a few days to enable a discussion would have resulted in such a decrease of output as has been the result of an immediate conflict with a large body of labor, and alarming suspicions in a munition factory, whose views are usually apposed to those represented by the News, criticized the Government for acting unwisely in the dispute, and declines to comment on the Government's announcement.

**Another Influence against the strike**

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**Will Get No Strike Pay.**  
BIRMINGHAM, Eng., July 26.—There was slight increase in the number of workers idle here today. Most of them, however, were compelled to stop work through a failure of the power supply. The secretary of the joint committee of the engineers and trade unions has announced that because the men struck, despite the advice of the unions' executives, no strike pay would be distributed.
