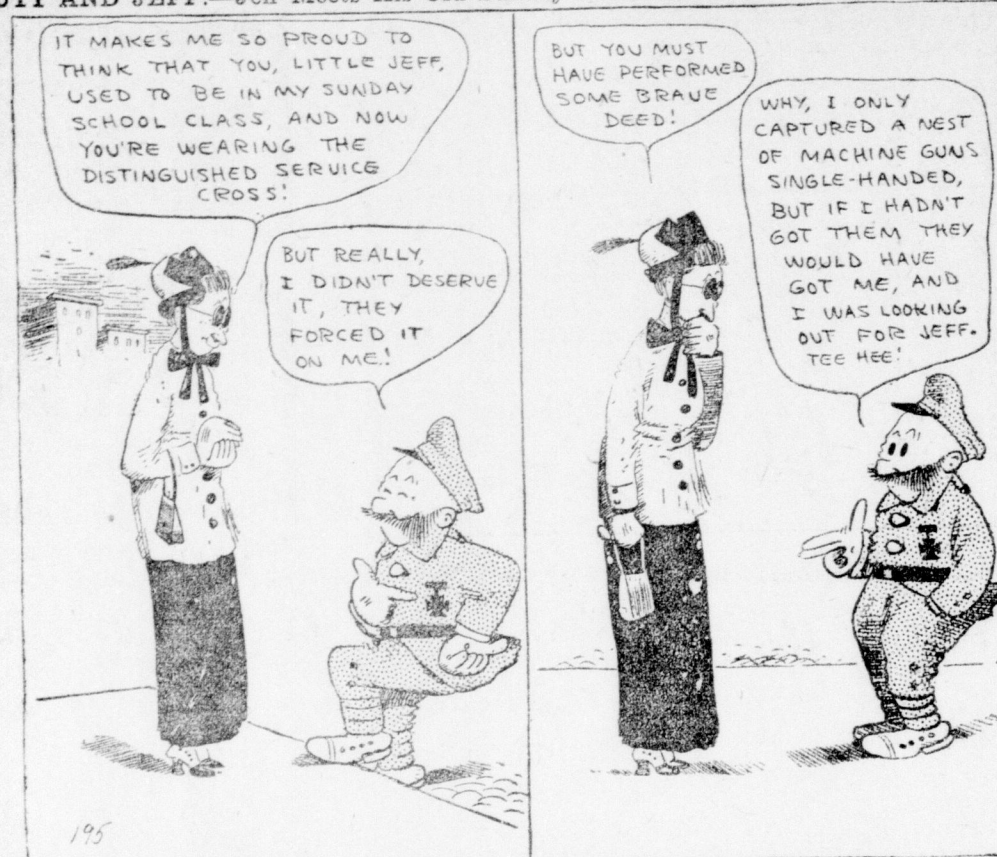

"I don't care so much about the rest of the team," he said, "but the pitchers must have lots of work to get in shape for the opening of the season."

FRENCH AVIATOR WILL LIKELY RACE IN BIG LIBERTY SWEEPSTAKES

Andre Biollot Planning To Come To America Shortly.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., April 10.—Andre Biollot, brother of the late Georges Biollot, star of the Peugeot racing team, is planning to come to America for the 500-mile Liberty Sweepstakes race on May 27, according to reports from Indianapolis.

Not only does Andre Biollot plan to race on the big race, but he also plans to bring a plane with him and give an exhibition flight before the race. Biollot has been a member of the French aviation service, the same unit of the French military forces in which his brother lost his life in the second year of the war. America has seen a few "copies" of his race in the edition of the Peugeot car and in 1914 Arthur Dury, with a small Peugeot of 135 cubic inches piston displacement, took second place in the Indianapolis 500-mile event. The car that Andre Biollot will bring with him is between the two, having a displacement of 152 cubic inches. This is one of five cars that the French factory built in 1914 for a road race in Les Mans, France, in August of that year. When the German invasion of France started, the cars were covered with tarpaulin to wait until the war was over and Biollot starts at Indianapolis. He will be the first race for this car. Just what the car can do at Indianapolis is not known, but the car is a Delage across the tape by less than a second.

Until the death of Georges Biollot, who made the Peugeot feared by Europeans, this car was heard of his brother Andre. He was a real driver for his brother's team of stars, but never started in a big race, as a vacancy always failed to develop. Also, he spent most of his time at the London branch of the Peugeot. He has raced in several events on the European circuit in England with the Peugeot. During the war he has down Newport and Spad planes and will be chief pilot for the Peugeot Company when he starts his horizon line uniform.
