A possible motive, or at least a line of reasoning, which may have had its effect in inducing the peculiar frame of mind which led to the poisoning was revealed in her conversation today.

"When the first baby came and it was a girl," she said, "I felt bad, because I wanted it to be a boy. I think girls have a much harder time in the world. When the second girl came, I didn't think much about it. I would rather have boys."

"When I am tired I get so blue I just don't know what I am doing. I never felt as blue as I did Sunday. I guess after I gave them the tablets everything seemed all black. And I didn't realize what was happening. I don't know how it was. You know, everything worries me. My mother was the same way.

Desire For Stage Not Motive.
"I don't see why they all think I did it because I want to go on the stage, except that I wanted to work, and music is all I know."

Her talk always reverts to the two sirls and their condition.

"I have often thought," she said, "that the girls would be better off dead than alive. I never thought before of doing away with them myself, but if they were sick or anything, it just came to me that if they should die they would avoid a lot of worry."

Prosecutor Gillespie has not yet endeavored to obtain a signed or formal statement of the poisoning from Mrs. Luikart, but continues to await the outcome of the condition of the two little girls.
