WELL SUPPLIED WITH ROPE.

Will Rogers has an endless supply of two things—ropes and stories. He uses both for the amusement of his friends and out at the Goldwyn studio in Culver City, where he is working in pictures now, there can always be heard laughs, ranging from chuckles to roars, when he is talking. He was explaining the other day why he had so many ropes. "You never can tell when you may be unable to get any more rope," he said.
