GERMANY GETS NOTE.—Paris, April 20.—The German Government has received an identical note from the Allied powers, warning her of the effect on the revivification of the country the establishment of a government opposed to executing the Versailles treaty would have, according to a semi-official statement issued today.

WILL CONSIDER ACT.—Ottawa, April 20.—The situation created by the judgment of the supreme court of the United States in declaring the migratory birds act unconstitutional is to be considered by the cabinet council. When congress passed the act a similar act was passed in Canada and a convention between the two countries was ratified. Further action will not be taken here, however, until the text of the judgment of the supreme court has been received from Washington.

DELIGHTFUL CONCERT.—The Elite Ladies Quartet gave a delightful concert in Centennial Methodist Church last evening, assisted by George E. Matthews, tenor, and George H. Andrews, baritone. The program consisted of quartets, duets, solos, violin selections and readings, and was under the auspices of the Epworth League. The quartet have voices of exceptional tone and quality. Rev. H. J. Ferguson introduced the artists, and Fred Fitzgerald, director of the quartet, acted as accompanist.

CALGARY G. W. V. A.—Secretary John Cunliffe of the G. W. V. A. announced this morning that the \$100,000 campaign which has been put on by the Calgary Command for the raising of funds with which to put up a new building will close on April 24. The city of Calgary donated the site for the new building, which will be three stories high and built on reinforced concrete with a stone front. Of the amount needed for the new building, one-quarter was given by the Province of Alberta.

NO DEFINITE DECISION.—No definite decision was reached at a joint meeting of the local master painters and the local employed painters, who have been out on strike since March. The meeting was called by the International Union of Painters, and was held at the residence of the plaintiff, Edythe Kerrigan, the plaintiff in the case, asking for a right-of-way to a building at Port Stanley. The appeal of the defendant, Emma Harrison, was against a judgment that the original agreement should be valid despite the action of the lake.

SYMPHONY CONCERT TUESDAY.—When the Musical Art Society Symphony Orchestra gives its annual concert next Thursday evening, noted visiting players will assist, including Frank Blachford, concert master of the Toronto Symphony; Frank Smith and Leo Smith, who play the viola and cello in the Toronto String Quartet and are well known here. A quartet of French horns, solo oboe, bassoon and English horn players will also be heard. The program will include Goldmark's Sakuntala Overture, Prelude to Lohengrin, three dances from Honfleur, and the William Tell Overture. Mr. Vigor Kihl will play with orchestra, and the concert will be conducted by the Liszt Hungarian Fantasy.
