

CONDITIONS IN MEXICO No Doubt as to Success of Public Ownership.

"Picking up," said R. N. Watson of Monterey, Mexico, in response to an enquiry as to the state of trade in the republic to the south of Uncle Sam's domains. The recent demoralization was partly due, he said, to the low prices of the base metals, copper, zinc etc., and partly to the disarrangemen incident to the taking over by the gov ernment of the railway systems of the country. There was not, he stated, the slightest doubt in the republic of the ultimate success of public ownership A consolidation was being thus achievwhich would result in greatly improved service. By the taking over of the Mexican Central and Mexican Na-tional, the entire railway system would be nationalized, with the exception of the road from Vera Cruz to Mexico City, owned in London, and the Harrian Pan-American line along the west

He also paid a high tribute to the drainage and water system recently completed by Mackenzie & Mann in his own city of Monterey at a cost of \$8,000,000. The citizens had been more than pleased at the shortness of the time in which the vast system was completed, and the manner in which the work had been done. They had also replaced the old mule system of street cars by an up-to-date trolley service. Monterey, he said, was an enterprising city of 100,000 inhabitants.
