During the corresponding week last year, wheat decreased 1,775,000 bushels, corn de- creased 116,000 bushels, and oats decreased 268,000 bushels.

London Statist figures world's wheat crop at 3,522,000,000, compared with 3,351,000,000 last year, and 3,065,000,000 two years ago.

Reports to the agricultural department at Washington say Russian wheat crop last year was 75,000,000, or 40,000,000 more than the United States, and 100,000,000 more than any previous crop.
