The Detroit Club will return to Wex-hatchie next spring. The presence of the big league players was a novelty there, and the practice sessions and exhibition games were well attended.

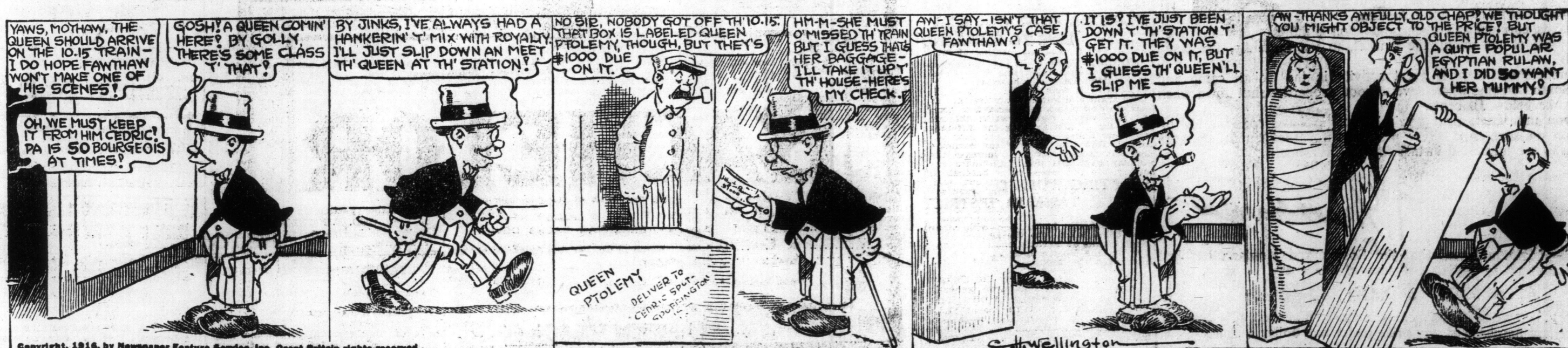
