The comments in the British Columbia Liberator, notwithstanding the encouragement they have not from the by-elections in Ontario and the sweep in British Columbia and Manitoba, are very doubtful of what they are likely to accomplish under the present leaders at Ottawa, and on the present platform. They want something new, they say, not call it a new party, but it will be a new party and a new platform on which they will stand; and now The World is seeking to organize and what the platform ought to be; and it is for that purpose that The World is entering on the discussion and is giving the public an opportunity to be heard.

Here is another letter received this week which bears in its direction. In the suggestion is made that the nationalization of railways and local radials must be the main plank in the platform of the new party. It is worthy of reading. Here is the letter: Editor World: In your campaign for a new party you have not asked Vox Populi to give advice. On Monday you promised to give publicity to press opinions; but correspondence was not solicited. The common people are busy knocking down the old; let us start building up the new. Somebody must take the laugh for suggesting something constructive.

I suggest nationalization of railways as a target number one for the professional marksmen of the Armies of Lottoland and the Armies of Nationalism. Nobody, however, expects any consistency in The Telegram, especially where The World is concerned. It is very hard to get any consistent outcome of The World's campaign in regard to the railways in South-west Toronto, and the absolute fall down of The Telegram's efforts in both these directions. The Telegram may say that its own articles that have appeared in the past have not been approved of and that it is open to be identified with it. It is a good deal like The Hamilton Herald, which also fell in the ditch with The Telegram in these two matters, and tries to make up for its loss by hammering The World every province. It is decidedly in the politics of every province. It is also in the politics of the Dominion. If not, why George Ham and Wallace Nesbitt?

The third party cannot succeed unless it has both provincial and national principles, programs, organization and representation. It must try to sand members to every legislature as well as to the houses of commons. The task looks appalling, but the new party must commence nationalizing, must enter all legislative bodies simultaneously. The other fellows are everywhere and their machinations are everywhere. Strength in Queen's Park will give frank strength at Ottawa and vice-versa. Frank Cochrane is at Toronto as well as at Ottawa. Why should not Brock and the principled Backs love recognition in both places? The battle must be joined all along the line. Unless we are in contact with the enemy everywhere, we are gripped with them everywhere, we will be outflanked and someones as we are now everywhere.

The only principle big enough to take into this biggest campaign in Canada today is the one of public ownership, nationalization of the steam railways of the Dominion. Each province has a problem of transportation, of finance or colonization, corresponding to ours. And we all share the burden which the transcontinental have placed and hope to place upon the whole country. Let the new party avoid the mistakes of the progressive party in the United States. There's a platform, was "nationalized" and the country is back to the square. The platform is ready to hand. What the old parties are seeking for an issue is the new party take the initiative. The issue is made broader, for the Dominion at least, and it is nationalization of railways.

And here is another letter, also received this week, where a very broad platform is outlined by a resident of the Township of York. Editor World: The articles appearing in The World on the formation of a new political party in Canada are apt to the time; there is dissatisfaction, both in federal and provincial politics. It would seem as if the federal Conservatives had fallen into the hands of the corporations and bankers, and then into a political sleep. The opposition at Ottawa, instead of having a progressive platform to offer to the people of Canada for their support, fully carries out Lord Chatham's humorous idea of what an opposition should be: Oppose everything, propose nothing, get the other fellows out of office. If there is any blessing coming out of the European war for Canada, it is that it has made the Canadian people think for themselves, instead of being guided and dictated by a party press in the control of corporations and trusts; and now they are beginning to realize where they are at, and how they have been governed, and that their representatives in parliament are in the hands of corporations, instead of looking after the people's interests. In the course of my business travels, like the Hon. I. B. Lucas, I "keep my ear to the ground," and I find there is a yearning for a new political party, both in the federal and provincial houses.
