EVERY DAY CLUB'S BENEFIT CONCERT
An Excellent Programme and a Fairly Good Attendance at Last Night's Entertainment

The benefit concert for the Every Day Club life and drug band last evening was much enjoyed. There were instrumental music by members of the band, and by Messrs. Malcolm and Kelly, and there were recitations by Miss Leggett and Mr. Grey; solos by Miss Walker, Fred Oram, Messrs. Macey, Moore, Williams and Hugh Campbell; dancing by Walter Leggett, Messrs. O'Brien and Ramsey; piccolo music by Messrs. Robinson, Sheehan, Skitch and Hinchell, and character sketches by Mr. Dupluis.

The programme was varied and excellent, with many humorous features, and scores were numerous. There was a fairly good attendance.

HANDSOME BANNER FOR THE MASTER PAINTERS
The Master Painters' and Decorators' Association have in their rooms an interesting relic of the centennial celebration of 1883. This is the banner carried by them in the procession on that occasion. It is a very artistic affair and was painted by N. A. Nielsen, a Norwegian artist who has since become prominent in his profession in the United States.

All the trades in the city were represented in the procession of 1883. Most of them had banners but it was claimed at the time that the painters was the best of all. It is eight feet in length by five feet in breadth. The ground work is of blue silk with a border of red plush velvet with gold lace and gold tassels.

On one side is painted the figure of a cherub with palette and brushes over a wreath of laurel leaves. On the other side the painters' coat of arms are emblazoned in colors. It shows for supporters, leopards rampant. In the center is a phoenix surrounded by flames. The quarters of the shield are phoenix heads in gold with a silver allure argent on an azure ground. The dexter corner shows three shields argent on a scarlet ground. The ribbon is crimson and the motto is "Amor et Obsequia"—love and obedience. Above and below the device appear "Centennial" and the date "1883" in gold. The banner is, considering its age, in a good state of preservation.

John Johnson, one of three trustees who had the care of the banner, returned it to the association at their meeting on Monday. At the same time he gave an interesting sketch of its history. At the time of the procession John H. Leah acted as marshal of the painters. He was mounted and dressed in white cords with riding boots and red velvet riding jacket with a cap of the same material.

BIG ROBBERY OF POSTAL ORDERS
Professional Thief Loots Boston Post Office of Orders to Value of \$13,400.
Cambridge, Mass., Feb. 9.—A robbery of postoffice money orders from sub-station No. 33, of the Boston postoffice, which may net the thief \$13,400, was effected here yesterday. The robber is supposed to be a professional crook and one of the band which has pilfered many stations in Boston and New England during the past few weeks. The sub-station is situated in the drug store of Maurice O'Donnell in Inman Square. The blanks numbered from 15,300 to 15,400. In addition to the blanks the robber secured a dis-marking the blanks as genuine, several other materials and a small quantity of stamps.

GETTING UP TO IT
Mexico City, Feb. 9.—A serious earthquake, lasting 35 seconds was felt near the volcano Colima yesterday. The eruption of the volcano continues with unabated grandeur. The activity of the volcano, however, has in no way frightened the inhabitants of the neighboring valleys, despite the frequent earthquakes and other tremors which accompany each eruption.

Fall River, Mass., Feb. 9.—All the weavers employed in the Sagamore mills, numbering 200, went on strike this afternoon. It is understood that the discharge of James Hargreaves, overseer of weaving in that mill, was the cause of the dissatisfaction. Hargreaves left the mill last Saturday but the operatives did not learn of the fact until today.
