

from the conversion of the Borden government to reciprocity. Six years ago Canada resounded with the cry that reciprocity, especially reciprocity in wheat, was disloyal and unpatriotic, would tear the Canada assunder and deliver the bleeding fragments over to the Yankees. The Borden government has now accepted the American offer of reciprocity in wheat and flour. The anti-reciprocity campaign of 1911 is utterly discredited and covered with ridicule.

With that experience fresh in the public mind, what will the people of Canada think of the conduct of Col. John Currie in raising another cry of the same kind, as false and even more mischievous? Col. John Currie says that if the Conservative government are turned out of office he would be sorry for the returned soldiers, because Liberals have no sympathy with them. Col. Currie knows as well as any man that Liberals and sons of Liberals have fought bravely in France, that many of them have given their lives to the cause, that others have come back crippled, shell-shocked, or gas-poisoned, that there are because a man holds Liberal views, he is without human feeling, and has no sympathy with his own son or brother or friend, who has done his duty and deserves the gratitude of the whole community, to whatever party he may belong?

There is no use in trying to evade the point by distinguishing between Liberal leaders and followers. Liberal leaders, too, have had their sorrows and anxieties, and they are as grateful as their political opponents and as eager to do justice to those who have served their nation and suffered in its service.

If there were among them such a number of ingrates as Col. Currie dreams of, the great body of Liberals in Canada would not allow him to remain in office one hour.

But what of the returned soldiers today? Are they satisfied, or are their friends satisfied, with the treatment they receive from the government? Col. Currie supports? Are they satisfied with the pensions they are paid, or the employment provided for them? Surely the raids on factories tell a very different story.

If Col. Currie wants to help the returned soldier let him throw his miserable partizanship aside, and insist upon proper treatment for the soldier from this government and from all the governments that may be in office for the rest of his life. He knows what the soldiers have done and what they deserve. Let him use his knowledge and give practical proof of his sympathy.

As to the Canadian people, they will not be fooled again by the men who talked bunkum against reciprocity to get into office, and adopted reciprocity to keep themselves in office.
