Says U.S. Should Be Represented At Admiralty

British Naval Expert Believes That Responsibility for War at Sea Should be Divided Among Allied Nations

New York, Oct. 26.—Arthur Pollen, the British writer on naval affairs, who has been in the United States several months, was asked today why an article had been written for publication in England, urging closer cooperation between the British and American navies in sea operations, had been suppressed by the censor in England. Mr. Pollen replied that the entire responsibility for conducting the sea war rested

with the British Admiralty, and he thought it was foolish to omit anything

which would strengthen the higher command and contribute to success.

It was of little importance, he said, whether his articles were published or not; the point was, not whether his reports were agreeable, but whether they were true.

"Ever since I arrived in this country in June," said Mr. Pollen, "I have been urging a closer co-operation between the British and American navies. It is not that the personal relations between the admiralty and the navy department and between the British and American officers at sea are not cordial, because they are; it is not because American advice is not freely invited nor information ever withheld; it is not that the American navy has done everything within its power, nor that any jealousy has been shown by one side or the other. My point is simply this: Today the entire responsibility for conducting the war at sea rests upon the British admiralty. If things go wrong, the whole blame can be thrown upon us. This is altogether unsatisfactory. No single power is solely responsible for the war on land. Why should a single power, even if much the greater sea power, be solely responsible for the war at sea? America cannot get into the war, nor once in the war, stay in it, unless the submarines are crushed, unless her transport service to France is secured, unless shipping is rightly built and rightly protected. These things mean successful war at sea and success depends entirely upon the higher command. For America to have no share in this command, is to hand over to others responsibility for her own communications. This is a false position.

Conduct was Criticized

"The conduct of the war at sea by the British admiralty during the last three years has been much criticized both at home and abroad. The recent German success in the Gulf of Riga, and loss of eleven convoys ships in the North Sea, have started this criticism afresh. It looks as if a considerable section in England were still lacking full confidence in the admiralty, in spite of the reorganization of this summer. This lends force to my arguments.

"My article was to urge that a commission of American naval officers, with requisite authority from the president, should be added to the board of admiralty, and so constitute a joint authority for running the sea war. America should share the power of command and the responsibility for the decision made. The British government has objected to publishing all my reasons for urging this. Dr. McNamara says that have attributed views to the American naval officers, which are not those actually expressed by the navy department, and that these views, if published, would comfort the enemy.
