Oils and Rails Again Hold Centre of Interest This Morning

**MONTREAL TREND IS SLIGHTLY UPWARD**

**B. C. Fishing Makes Gain But Later Recedes—Asbestos in Good Demand**

NEW YORK, June 23.—Stock prices moved irregularly higher at the opening of today's market with the oil and gas the centres of speculative interest. Rails continued to respond to the publication of unusually favorable May earnings reports, and oils were helped by reports of a decrease in crude oil production last week. Case Theatricals opened 2 1/2 points higher and General Electric advanced 1/4. Union Oil of California and Pan Handle Producers and Refiners were heavy on profit taking.

**MONTREAL MARKET**

MONTREAL, June 23.—There was a fair volume of trading on the local stock exchange during the first half hour this morning, with values displaying a firm to slightly downward trend. B. C. Fishing, the leader, opened at 7 1/4 for an overnight gain of a half point, touched 7 1/2 in later trading, but subsequently reacted to 7 1/4 for a net gain of three-quarters point. Brazilian was fairly active and steady selling around 52. Asbestos preferred was in good demand at 7 1/4. Other changes included Steamships preferred, off three-quarters at 79; Alcohol off an eighth at 18 1/2; Dominion Bridge, off an eighth at 100 1/4; Breweries up a quarter at 60 1/2; and Price Bros of three-quarters at 67 1/2.

**C. N. R. TO LOSE QUARTER OF LINE TO PROSPERITY**

**Rhode Island Governor Refuses to Call Meeting for Extension**

FREDERICTON, June 23.—A special despatch to the Daily Gleaner from Providence, R. I., says: "Governor Aram J. Pothier has, for the third time within the past two weeks, refused to call a special session of the General Assembly to extend the charter of the defunct Southern New England Railroad for another year.

"This charter expires June 30 unless extended, and the road will be junked. The property is now being sold. It is owned by the Federal District Court for Rhode Island.

"In a letter to George L. Crooker, chairman of the Rhode Island Foreign and Domestic Commerce Commission, the Governor refused the request of the commission chairman to call a session. He refused a similar request made last week by Senator John J. Barry, of Central Falls.

"The Governor told Chairman Crooker that he found no new facts giving 'tangible assurance' that if the charter were extended the road, on which \$7,000,000 already has been expended, would be completed. He said he had talked with leaders of the Legislature and that they held the same view."

**Dog's Bark Probably Saves Score of Lives**

NEW YORK, June 23.—A five-year-old mongrel, Fritzle, pet of a chauffeur's family, probably saved a score of persons early one morning recently by barking an alarm of fire. After policemen and civilians had helped firemen rescue the occupants of 431 Fremont and 433 East 137th street, the Bronx, Fritzle ran out, barked some more, frolicked a bit and then disappeared. Whether the dog followed its owner to the new quarters he took up, the whereabouts of which were not learned, no one knew.

**HISTORIC CHURCH IN LONDON SOLD**

**Structure Once Occupied by French Huguenots of Metropolitan Area Became Anglican**

(By Dominion News Service)

LONDON, June 23.—After having been closed for 18 months the French (Anglican) church of the Savoy, in Shaftesbury avenue, has been sold. Founded by French Huguenot refugees, who in 1601 received letters patent from Charles II, the congregation had latterly consisted mainly of people who wished to improve their knowledge of French.

This fact was revealed in a report by the Ecclesiastical Commissioners in 1907, when they pointed out that very few French-born Protestants remained, the descendants of the Huguenots having been mostly absorbed into the Church of England.

The church was under the jurisdiction of the Bishop of London, and was the only such in the diocese where the English service was held in the French language.

**HEAD OF BOY HELD IN BRIDGE**

**Firemen, Doctors and Police Save Lad After 45 Minutes**

LONDON, June 23.—For three-quarters of an hour recently firemen, doctors, police, medical students, ambulance men, and workmen strove hard to release a boy aged six, who had faced his head in the ornamental balustrade of Westminster Bridge.

Before the terrified child was freed by the breaking of part of the thick metal with a cold chisel, the following steps had to be taken by the various authorities concerned:

Scaffolding erected outside the bridge over the river.

Boats stationed beneath.

Fire escape and fire emergency van summoned.

Body of police drafted to spot.

Permission obtained from the London County Council to cut their bridge.

An attempt to file through metal work with a hacksaw.

All this time the boy, who was held by his little brother and sister, he thought he would look at the steamers in the river below.

Against the advice of his brother, William, aged eight, he pushed his head through one of the shamrock-shaped openings.

The points of the shamrock are only 4-1/2 inches apart, and though Daniel pushed his head through without difficulty and had a good look at the river, he was unable to withdraw it.

**SCREAMED SHRILLY.**

At once he set up a shrill screaming as a crowd began to gather.

A message was sent to St. Thomas's Hospital, and three medical students went to the spot with vials. They smeared Daniel's head and the metal with the substance—but still he could not be freed.

The crowd, which had now assumed considerable dimensions, was increased by the arrival of a London Fire Brigade.

Brass-helmeted firemen examined the bridge on either side by two men, so as to relieve any pressure on the bridge, and it was decided that the only way to free him was to break away part of the metal work.

Before the demolition set of willfully damaging the fabric of Westminster bridge could be taken, however, a message was sent to the Council of the London County Council. A constable was sent to the County Hall, where he was asked if a little bit of the bridge might be taken to release a small boy, and had his request courteously granted—the usual formalities being waived for this occasion.

A piece of metal was finally chipped off with a chisel and the boy, who was by now purple in the face, was freed.

He was immediately carried to a motor-ambulance, which had been waiting half an hour to receive him, and was taken to St. Thomas's Hospital, where lacerations behind his ears, caused by his own efforts to free himself were dressed.

Amber, of the Central Y, covered the 1,000 yards with a breast stroke in the new record time of 8:12, while Gordon Lewis used the back stroke for 100 yards for the new mark of 1:19 2-5.

**BULL KNOCKS DOWN 20 MEN, INJURING 3**

**Injured Animal Breaks Loose at Dockyards Near Birkenhead, England**

More than 20 people were knocked down and three of them injured—one man seriously—by a bull in a mad charge near the Liverpool docks recently.

A number of cattle had been driven off the Birkenhead lagoon boat up the floating roadway on their way to the Liverpool abattoir. A young bull which had been resting since leaving the ferry broke loose when it reached the street and dashed back along the Dock road towards the pierhead.

Doctors who tried to stop the infuriated animal were bowled over.

At the top of the floating bridge led to the roadway single-handed, the bull extended his arms in the hope of frightening the bull, but made his escape when the animal lowered its head and charged.

When the bull reached the bottom of the floating bridge it dashed at the pierhead and tried to get at the men who were working there. A policeman named William Madden, who was in the crowd, was struck, and he fell by his horns. The bull charged and fell on him. The policeman, named Madden, then went to the rescue, smashing his baton by repeated blows on the animal's head.

While the bull was temporarily stunned Madden was pulled from underneath. No sooner was a rope attached to its head than the animal staggered to its feet and dashed at a crowd named James Kinella, aged 21, Hanover square, Dublin, who was almost thrown over the railings into the river.

Kinella was seriously hurt and removed to hospital. Before the animal had been secured a number of other people were knocked down, but they escaped serious injury.

The final capture of the bull was made into higher ground by the pier-head overlooking the landing-stage.
