At the Cinema House where the battle picture was being thrown on the screen, the raiders acted so swiftly that the operator did not realize what was happening until the job was nearly completed. Seven men all armed did the work. At the point of revolvers the manager was compelled to return the money of the spectators, after which the men made their way out of the theatre. One of them, however, lagged, and was seized and turned over to the police. Later he was remanded by the magistrate for the theat of the film and for carrying a loaded revolver.

WALES FILM SEIZED.

It was at Kingstown that the picture of the Prince of Wales was stolen. Here the job was done in five minutes. This film had aroused opposition on two previous occasions when ink was thrown on the screens upon which it was being projected. The gang which seized the film paid admission to the show.
