

FIND OLD HULK 50 FEET UNDER NEW YORK STREET

Workmen Get Old Coins Too, in Digging for Sky-scraper Foundation.

New York, Oct. 25.—"Sand hogs" working 50 feet underground on the foundations of the New York Telephone Company's building at West street and Park Place, have unearthed several rare American coins dating back to the latter part of the eighteenth century.

An official of the New York Foundation Company, which has charge of the work, said that 50 feet underground the men found the hull of an old vessel about the size of a modern canal boat.

While digging out the hull of the old vessel the men found coins which are bronze or copper. One bears the world "Libertas," and is dated 1793. On the reverse side is the inscription "Constitutio Nova." Another coin found is dated 1780. Of the nine coins found no two are alike. Another is that of a man's head, with the horns attached. This was dug out of the mud 12 feet below the hull.

Anglican Missions Board In Session

Several Changes in Location of Clergy in Diocese Are Announced.

The transfer of Rev. Craig W. Nichols of Westfield to Hardwick was announced at the meeting of the board of missions of the Fredericton Diocese yesterday, and a number of other changes in the placing of clergymen, Bishop Richardson arrived at noon and presided at the afternoon and evening meetings.

The social service committee took up conditions in the St. John jail, the matter of gambling at provincial fairs, and the matter of obtaining larger indemnification of church people in New Brunswick. The opening of the memorial chapel at Robbsey College and the opening of the new extension to the Church of England Institute were under discussion.

The social service council also took up the matter of gambling at the provincial fairs. H. A. Porter, manager of the St. John Exhibition, is a member of the council and he spoke at length on the subject expressing the willingness of the Exhibition Association directors to meet with the council to discuss the matter. It was finally decided to ask the Evangelical Alliance to appoint a committee representative of all the Protestant church bodies in the city to meet with the association directors.

With regard to the desirability of bringing more Anglican people to the diocese it was decided to leave this matter in the hands of the chairman to let it up with Rev. L. E. Thompson, parson, when he is in St. John this winter.

The board of missions which met in the evening heard reports of deputations to several missions and the announcements of resignations and appointments. The resignations were as follows: Rev. H. Hesketh, from Hardwick; Rev. C. W. Nichols, from Westfield, to take effect on Nov. 6; Rev. G. E. Truman, from Prince William; Rev. James Spencer, from Bright, retired; Rev. P. G. Cotton, from Trinity church, St. Stephen, to accept a charge in Old Town, N.S., and Rev. Reginald Britton, from Ladlow, to take effect on Nov. 5. Appointments were announced as follows: Rev. C. W. Nichols, to Hardwick; Rev. G. E. Truman, to Sackville and Dorchester; Rev. Reginald Britton, to Kingsport; Rev. A. Brown, (deacon), to Hammond River, and Rev. E. P. Wright, curate of St. Luke's, St. John, to Trinity church, St. Stephen.

The parishes and missions which were reported vacant were Hildroft and Wedford, Canning and Chipman, Prince William and Dumfries, Hillsboro, Westfield, Gordon and Lorne, Wilmot and Wicklow and Bright.

MAGEE LAND CASE DECISION GIVEN

A decision by His Lordship Justice Audette of the Exchequer Court of Canada has just been handed down awarding to T. Walker Magee et al the sum of \$400 an acre for land off the Marsh road expropriated by the Government for C. N. R. yard improvements. This is the sum tendered the defendants in the first instance, but in Justice Audette's finding they are allowed interest from the date of expropriation and also cost with exception of three-quarters of the evidence cost.
