## ADVANCED THEORY FOR BETTER WORLD

Concentration on Welfare of  
the Child.

Mrs. Nellie McClung, Noted  
Canadian Writer, Claimed  
the Universe Suffered from  
Too Much Masculine Rule  
—Said Prohibition Neces-  
sary.

If the world is ever going to be made  
a better place to live in our new civiliza-  
tion must center on the child and con-  
centrate on its welfare. This was the  
remedy to the social and political status  
of the world advanced by Mrs. Nellie  
McClung, member of the Legislature  
of Alberta and noted Canadian writer,  
when she spoke to over three thousand  
people in St. Andrew's Church, West-  
mount, last night.

Mrs. McClung has just returned from  
England where she investigated the so-  
cial conditions. She said that her eyes  
had been opened to the only solution to  
a better civilization, the welfare of the  
child.

"If I had my life to live over again,"  
said Mrs. McClung, "I would devote it  
entirely to work among the children,  
that is the only way to save the world.  
The incorruptible heart of the child is  
the material we must work on. Any-  
thing can be done with a child. And it  
is with the women coming into public  
life as guardians and custodians of the  
outlook changes."

"The world today suffers from too  
much masculine rule," continued Mrs.  
McClung. "From the men who used  
their scientific geniuses to discover the  
most devastating poisons during the  
war, who invented the most destruc-  
tive guns and projectiles and whose  
only object was ruthless conquest. Im-  
planted in the woman's heart is the  
protective spirit and the ending of the  
worst into public life is the solution."  
Prejudice Removed.

Mrs. McClung began by saying that  
she remembered the day when there was  
a great deal of prejudice against women  
speaking, especially on politics. In  
countries of miles away, the  
formula had been laid down that it was  
not a time for women to do to make  
speeches to be active in social mat-  
ters. Then had come the day when peo-  
ple began talking of the "awakening  
of women." She repeated the term; it  
looked as if they had been asleep, but  
the truth of the matter was that the  
mothers of yesterday had been too busy  
with household affairs. When the men  
set up factories and all kinds of labor  
saving devices the woman came into her  
own and she had now come to stay to  
take a hand in the affairs of the world.  
The men had used their ingenuity to  
kill and destroy, the women had  
brought the spirit of creation, the in-  
fluence of peace without which the world  
could never hope to be anything but a  
place of strife and hate. While in Eng-  
land she studied the system of Contin-  
uation Schools, as operated by the Lon-  
don County Council, which provided for  
the employment and unrest which pre-  
vailed everywhere. The answer had come:  
better housing, education and prohibi-  
tion.

"If we could only rid our hearts,"  
said the speaker, "of fear, for it is fear  
which leads men to go to war and na-  
tions to keep on arming, we could look  
at things in a normal way, for I don't  
believe the world wants war."

Mrs. McClung deplored the conditions  
in England in regard to drinking stat-  
istics that there were 700,000 confirmed  
drunkards of both sexes over there. Pro-  
hibition, she said, was a long way off,  
but some day the stout hearts of oak of  
some of the English people would make  
them realize the enormity of the evil  
caused by alcohol.

RAILWAY COMMISSION  
REFUSES REQUEST RE  
CREAM EXPRESS RATES

Ottawa, Nov. 16.—(Canadian Press).—  
The board of railway commissioners yes-  
terday refused the applications of the  
national dairy council for an order can-  
celling the twenty per cent. increase in  
express rates on cream allowed on Feb.  
2, 1921, and re-establishing the previous  
commodity rates on cream.
