FOR DRUG ADDICTS

Intimation of This in Inspection of Penitentiaries by the Hon. D. D. McKenzie.

Victoria, B. C., July 26—Intimation of the possible establishment of a system of institutions throughout the dominion for the care and treatment of drug addicts, or for special accommodation for them, was made here yesterday by Hon. D. D. McKenzie, solicitor general for Canada.

He said that he was visiting the penal institutions to ascertain conditions under which men and women were held in confinement, with a view of being able to make suggestions to the premier, as to how improvements could be brought about, particularly regarding those addicted to the drug habit.

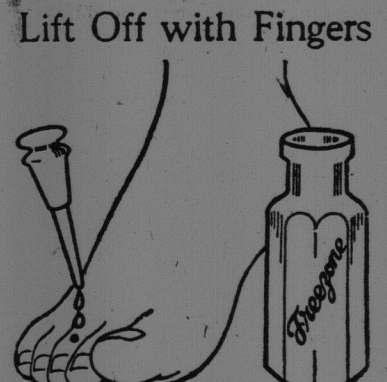
## KEEPING BOYS ON THE FARM

## CONSTABLE SHOT TWICE.

Sherbrooke Officer Wounded by Robbers.

Sherbrooke, July 26—Shot twice in rapid succession Constable Wilfrid Gauvreau, of No. 4 police station, lies in a critical condition at the St. Vincent de Paul Hospital. In addition to two serious wounds, his condition was aggravated by the fact that he had lain by the roadside for three hours before he was discovered and had weakened considerably owing to the loss of blood.

The constable had been following a couple of suspicious characters whom he had noticed around the Quintal property, on King street east, near Murray street, and trailed them as far as the St. Pierre overall factory on Council street. The two men appeared to hesitate about coming out of the shadows and were apparently preparing to force a window when Constable Gauvreau called to them.

His challenge was greeted by a couple of bullets, one of which passed through his right thigh, while the other bullet entered behind the right shoulder and came out at the left side of the neck. Gauvreau retained enough presence of mind to fire

a shot from his own revolver, but it evidently went wide. He managed to drag himself along Council street for a distance of about a hundred yards, but weakened by the loss of blood, he stumbled and fell in the roadway. It was nearly three hours later, at about 5:20 a.m., that Mr. Ludger Blouin found Constable Gauvreau.

At a meeting of the creditors of W. H. B. Saddle yesterday afternoon in the office of the Canada Permanent Trust Co., authorized assignee, it was reported that disposal of half the assets had been successfully accomplished and the balance will be sold at once. Another meeting will be held in August.
