REV. J. J. RYAN INSPECTING INDIAN PROVINCE SCHOOLS

(New Freeman) Rev. J. J. Ryan passed through the city this week en route to Richibucto, on his semi-annual tour of inspection of Indian schools. Last week he visited the schools in Madawaska and Victoria counties.

Since assuming the position of Inspector, Father Ryan has accomplished much for the educational uplift of the Indians of this province. Under his direction several modern and up-to-date school houses have been built, and educational facilities provided for the Indians. For the first time in the history of the province, two young Indian boys from the Tobique Reserve, have been privileged to enjoy the advantages of a university education, and are at present pursuing a course of higher studies at St. Joseph's University.
