

LAYS CHARGE OF HIGHWAY ROBBERY Serious Case Brought to Court by Workman On Courtenay Bay Operations

A story of a daring highway robbery was told in the police court this morning. Percy Paul, twenty-eight years of age was arrested between three and four o'clock this morning on a charge of assaulting Douglas Woodley in the Red Head road and robbing him of \$24. The preliminary examination was begun before Magistrate Ritchie, and the prisoner was remanded until tomorrow morning.

The two men were employed on the Courtenay Bay work, and Woodley said that he knew the man to see him, as he had come in contact with him at times while at work, but he did not know him personally. He said the accused met him in the afternoon in the foreman's shack and, without any provocation, struck him in the jaw. The witness said that after that he met him in a beer shop kept by Fred Hoyt, and when he left Paul followed him, and when about 100 yards from Kane's corner, grabbed him from behind and threw him down. He said he was choked so that he could not call out, and that he was robbed of all the money he had in his pockets, four \$5 bills, a \$2 and a \$1 bill, besides some small change amounting in all to about \$24. Among the change which he said he had in his pocket was an English penny which he had had for eight years, he said, and which he said bore the date of either 1802 or 1803. An English penny which had been taken from the prisoner when he was searched by Policeman Collins at the time of the arrest, was produced
