Regina, Nov. 4.—That the farmers of Saskatchewan realize the importance of increasing the production of wheat is evident from the extent of fall plow-ing that is going on at present. S. The idea is that each citizen be allowed to have as much city property as he may be able to use, for the production of vegetables in spare time.

That Saskatchewan is going steadily ahead is evident from the reports re-ceived from the government depart-ments. The latest is that of the tele-phone department. It shows that 251 applications for the incorporation of rural telephone companies, representing 7,506 miles of line and 7,284 subscribers were received during the year.
