TRYING TO GET HER DAUGHTER FREE FROM THE HOLLOWAY JAIL

Mother of Suffragette, on Hunger Strike, Will Not, However, Advise Her to Give In

London, March 31—Mrs. H. R. Emerson of Detroit, assisted by Miss Scott-Troy of San Francisco and others, is trying to enlist the good offices of American women married to titled Englishmen to secure the release of Miss Zelle Emerson from Holloway jail, where she is serving a term of imprisonment for breaking windows in company with other militant suffragettes. Miss Emerson, who started a "hunger strike" on entering prison, is suffering much from forcible feeding. It is hoped by Mrs. Emerson that the support of the Duchess of Marlborough will be obtained.

Miss Emerson, who has been incarcerated for five weeks, has three more weeks to go. She is being visited daily, but she complains that they are disposed to regard the matter jokingly. She was at first fed through her nose but the process became so painful that later by the food has been passed through her mouth which is less trying.

"When it was suggested to her mother, 'Why do you not advise your daughter to eat the prison food?' she said she 'never would do that' is a matter of principle."

WAR SITUATION

London, March 31—A Vienna despatch to the Daily Mail says:

"Austria has three army corps on the Herzegovina frontier, ready to enter Montenegro should the pressure from the powers, which it is intended to repeat and intensify, be insufficient."

London, March 31—A Hademikent despatch to the Daily Chronicle, describing the night at Buyuk Chetmedze, says that the Bulgarians hurled 20,000 men against the Turkish advanced position, and during the darkness carried it with military ease, the Turks retiring on their main position.

LOCOMOTIVE INTO RIVER; ONE BELIEVED DROWNED

East Putney, Vt., March 31—One man is believed to have been drowned and the lives of six others were imperiled yesterday when an engine and a caboose on the Central Vermont Railway fell into the Connecticut River two miles north of here. Willis Peritt, aged 22, a fireman whose home is in Winchendon, Mass., has been missing since the accident.

WAR SITUATION (continued)

London, March 31—The demobilization of the Serbian army began today.

At daylight the Turks bombarded the captured position and prevented the Bulgarians from retreating. Subsequently the Turks delivered a counter attack, 6,000 infantry storming the position with the bayonet. After toiling up the muddy slopes, the Turks flung themselves on the Bulgarians and a desperate bayonet fight ensued. The Bulgarians were driven out of the position down the slope on the opposite side.

Moncton, N. B., March 31—The storm last week was quite severe in the vicinity of Shute and did considerable damage to the Robinson Ferry Company. Hon. C. W. Robinson received a message that about 60 feet of the bank of the main driving dam had been washed away leaving a channel about thirty feet wide. No logs were lost. Mr. Robinson has left for Shute. The damage is about \$1,000 besides holding back the spring drive.

Mexico City, March 31—A reported that Pascual Orozco, the elder, has been executed by Zapata's soldiers.

Friedrichshafen, Germany, March 31—The Prince of Wales arrived here today but did not make an ascent in the new Zeppelin dirigible, owing to sharp squalls.

Laredo, Texas, March 31—Eighty-nine were killed and many wounded in a desperate sixteen hour battle on Friday and Saturday at Laredo, eighty miles south of here between a regiment of federalists and 800 followers of Carranza, the rebel governor of Coahuila.

SUFFRAGISTS AGAIN

London, March 31—Suffragists created a scene at the resumption of the inquiries into the wireless contracts of the British government, when Mr. David Lloyd George, chancellor of the exchequer, took the stand today.

The chancellor used the word "principle" and a male suffragist shouted an angry protest. He exclaimed "I object to that man using the man 'principle'." He is a traitor. He had betrayed the women."

The interrupter was promptly ejected, but another soon interposed. Lloyd George had remarked that he was not a speculator and had never bought to sell again, when a suffragette cried out: "You sold the women all right."

Both the interrupter and her sympathizers were thrown out.
