With labor saving machinery so powerful that it glut the market with goods, with armies of men seeking in vain for employment, we still put armies of school children in factories before their bones and muscles are developed, and before their brains have been developed by continuous and effective thinking. Muscles without intelligence are cheap today and with the invention of machines that can almost do everything but think, muscles alone will command an ever decreasing price.

Premier Aquilth speaks of the industrial situation in England, and of the seething unrest that found partial expression in the strike of last August. But the unrest is not confined to England. It is as wide as civilization. Property has always been timid, but today to the timidity of property must be added the timidity of the so-called ruling classes, the captains of industry. These who were once sure of their ground now walk in doubt and perplexity, facing larger problems than they know how to solve.

NEW ARMOR PLATE

London, Nov. 17.—A German engineer named Schaumann has invented an entirely new kind of armor plate which has just been tested by the naval authorities and reported upon favorably.

The peculiarity of the armor is its extreme lightness, as compared with Krupp armor, while it has been proved, it is said, to be of equal, if not greater, resisting power. The armor is made up of a special aluminum alloy faced by a thin, hardened steel plate. Gun shields of it have been definitely ordered for the new cruiser Strassburg and its extensive employment is expected.

It is expected to be extremely useful for armament of small vessels. In such cases something like a revolution in small cruiser construction may be anticipated. More important still, the system is likely to be found applicable to destroyers without appreciably reducing their speed—the thing that has always defeated all attempts to armor destroyers in the past. It is computed that the vital parts of destroyers could be completely protected by the new armor without the loss of more than one knot speed at the utmost. This would render them virtually immune against 12-pounders.

Go an' gat som' green," he say.


"An' eef you no do eet, too,



FIRST AID ON C. P. R.

More Than Hundred Classes With 1,800 to 2,000 Employees Members

Of such value does the C. P. R. consider its "first aid to the injured" work that it is now extending its sphere of activities in this connection. Formerly the railway's "first aid" work was largely confined to the employees of its operating departments, but now the work is being extended to all classes of employees, classes being formed among the clerks and office staffs. This is being done not so much for the advantage of the railway itself, but from a feeling which those at the head of the railway have that everybody should have at least a rudimentary knowledge of "first aid."

Altogether on the C. P. R. system there are now between 1,800 and 2,000 men enrolled in the classes. Among the cities and towns in which these classes are situated are Montreal, Toronto, Winnipeg, Calgary, Vancouver, Victoria, Brandon, Carleton Place, Fort William, Port Arthur, Hecelaga, Kenora, Nelson, North Bay, Ottawa, Outremont, Smith Falls, St. John, Hawke, London, Farnham, McMillan Junction, Windsor, Elliot, Goderich, Port Berry, Chapleau, Serber, White River, Wabowag, Sault Ste. Marie, Sudbury and Big Inlet. Altogether there are more than one hundred classes. Montreal city heads the list with ten.
