New York, July 12—The spot light shined frequently yesterday in the inquiry to the shooting of W. E. D. Stokes, the millionaire hotel man. KING AND QUEEN VISIT DUBLIN SLUMS

Show Marked Interest in Condition of The Lowly Rather Than in Society Affairs (New York Herald) New York, July 12—The Herald's Dublin cable says: "He who mistakes the significance of the visit of King George and Queen Mary to Ireland must be blind indeed. In coming to Dublin and visiting the slums on Thursday and then visiting Scotland afterwards, and in also planning tours around the seas, the Irish King and Queen are acting not for pomp and show. Not to please the great nobles or placate the Irish politician, or win the Catholic clergy, as the sovereign comes to Ireland to do. The politicians and priests were pleased when the accession oath was modified. George V. Queen Mary and their advisers have a deeper heart-reaching purpose, a list of which was given at the time of the Coronation, when George and Queen Mary promised to the great work ahead of the king in helping to uplift the toiling masses."

FACT DUB IN SLUMS

The king visited the slums of Dublin on Saturday night, and the effect of the revelation was shown when the queen visited the slums yesterday, accompanied by the Duchess of Devonshire, Lady Herby, Lady St. Helens, Lady Shaftesbury, and other noblewomen. She was seen to be deeply interested in the poor by a call to the County Maternity hospital, where after speaking words of cheer and comfort to the inmates, she presented a banquet with her own hands to Georgina Mary Carroll, who was born on Coronation day, and is known as the "Coronation Baby."
