

WORLD'S CHAMPIONS TAKE LEAD IN AMERICAN LEAGUE RACE

Rideaus Vanquish University of British Columbia in Opening Game

WASHINGTON IS MAKING STRONG BID FOR PENNANT

Unreckoned Contenders Still Clinging To Leaders

NEW YORK, April 28.—Opening of the third week of the 1925 major league season today finds unreckoned contenders still clinging to the flying coat tails of the champion New York Giants and Washington Senators, with pre-season first division favorites manifesting no signs of recovering from slumps.

As Washington again stepped out into undisputed possession of first place from a tie with Philadelphia in the American league yesterday, the veteran Walter Johnson, giving Boston only four hits, the Detroit Tigers pitched deeper into the mire by dropping their seventh straight game to the Browns, 5 to 3.

Yankees Were Idle
The Yankees, saved by rain yesterday, have likewise been one of the early season disappointments, with only a slight edge on Detroit.

In the National League, Pittsburgh has almost matched Detroit in a failure to strike the gut figured for them on the basis of their form last year. Signs of recovery are seen by Pirates followers in their last two victories over the Cardinals, however.

Cleveland In Third
Cleveland in the American barreled third place against the aggressive push of the White Sox, when George Uhle let the Sox down with five hits, while his team mates were gathering nine.

George Siler led the attack of the St. Louis Browns with three singles, making the fourth consecutive game in which he has hit safely and helped his team to a five to three victory over Detroit.

ACCORDING to articles appearing in the Amherst News Nixey Kennedy, former Maritime amateur lightweight champion, and Willie Mitchell, Maritime amateur welterweight title holder, have been matched to meet in Amherst on May 11. Considerable publicity is being given to the proposed bout, but it is doubtful if it will be staged. According to amateur rules simon pure boxers cannot be matched like professions and may only compete in an authorized meet. It is doubtful if Kennedy will risk his amateur standing. According to rumors going the rounds Mitchell is sailing under a cloud. It is said that he participated in a professional bout in 1920. Unless Kennedy is contemplating taking a jump into the money class it certainly would not pay him to endanger his amateur standing.

It is to be hoped that their differences will be patched up and that satisfactory arrangements will be made whereby they will all get together for the good of the game.

VANCOUVER, B. C., April 28.—The Rideau Aquatic Club of Ottawa made a strong bid for the amateur basketball championship of Canada here last night when they defeated the University of British Columbia team by a score of 28 to 18, and will go into the final game on Thursday night with a ten point advantage.
