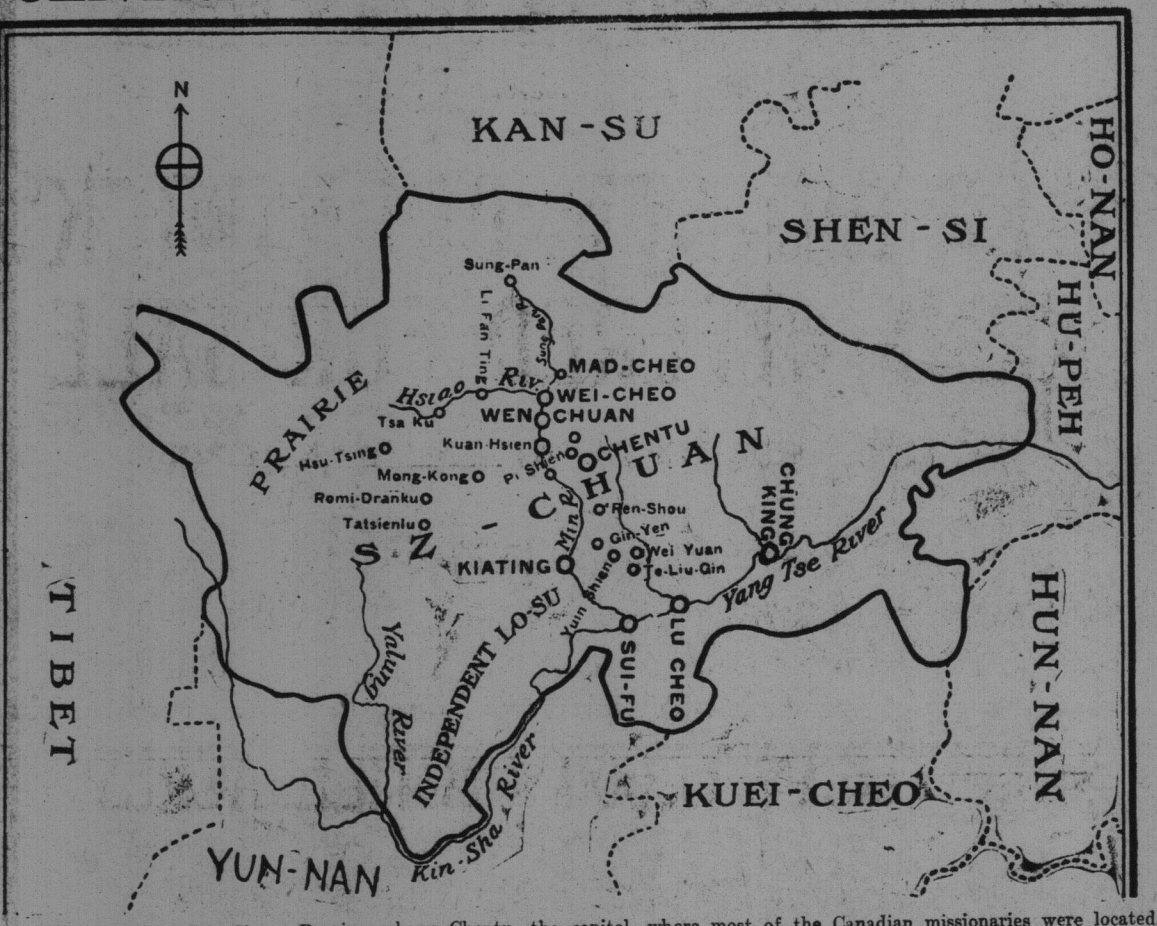


CENTRE OF THE TROUBLE IN CHINA

GRAVE TIME, IT IS FEARED, IS TO COME IN RUSSIA. Another Campaign of Revolutionary Agitation is Said to Have Been Planned.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 18.—It is currently reported that Russia is to be the scene of another campaign of revolutionary agitation, and perhaps even something worse. All the revolutionary processes of other countries are said by a well-known writer, M. Menashchikoff, to play the role of magnetic induction as regards Russia.

In any case it is said that two waves of revolutionary criminality are about to sweep across Russia, one from the east and the other from the west. While Russian socialist emigrants and anarchists are flocking in from the European west, a corresponding influx of discharged emigrants have had the effect of rekindling Russian agitators to further action.

At a recent conference, held in Paris, some thirty Russian socialist revolutionary leaders from all countries, decided to unite all parties for reinforcing their propaganda among the Russian masses, especially among the labor proletariat in the towns, as it was shown that this class together with the troops, and possibly the mightier hand of the bourgeoisie, are the elements which gained success for the revolution in Constantinople and London. It was decided to adopt revolutionary propaganda, otherwise robbery under the name of the revolutionary officers, was held in Paris by the Russian social democrats.

A lengthy bulletin was prepared yesterday afternoon by the physicians, in view of the change for the worse, as it was deemed advisable to inform the public of the true nature of the premier's wounds. The bullet has been removed. The patient stood the operation well in every way.

Billy Queal Wins Sensational Eight Mile Race in Toronto and Nearly Equals World's Record. Toronto, Ont., Sept. 18.—(Canadian Press)—Billy Queal, of New York, won the eight mile professional race on Saturday night, after a hair raising contest, in the fast time of 41.7, one minute and one second, behind Shambly's world's record. So fast was the pace that Tom Longboat was obliged to drop out at 3.12 miles, while Shambly's record was reached. The New Yorker, however, had a little too much left. Abbie Wood was third, a half lap back, with Hefferon fourth, a lap away. Shambly did not start, owing to injuring himself in Amherst, N. S.
