VESSELS STILL BUSY

French Cruisers Continue to Shell Moorish Horsemen.

300 MOORS WERE KILLED

Sultan Is Urged to Hasten Promised Reforms—Steps Taken to Protect Europeans—Guard Landed at Rambahat—French Sailor Badly Wounded—Garrison of Casablanca Has Been Disarmed.

Tangier, Aug. 8.—Upon the demand of the French charge d'affaires, Mohammed Torres, the representative of the Sultan here, has reiterated the instructions he had previously issued to assure the safety of the Europeans at Tangier and elsewhere.

The French steamer *Murad*, which brought the news of the bombardment of Casablanca, has been requisitioned by the French charge d'affaires, who will use her as a despatch boat.

A guard to protect the French consulate will immediately be landed at Rambahat.

The French charge d'affaires has made these formal demands on the Moroccan Government:

First.—That the Moroccan authorities at Casablanca place themselves under the orders of the commander of the French forces.

Second.—That the security of the French citizens at Fez and other places in the interior be guaranteed.

Third.—That the Moroccan authorities hasten the reparation for the murder of Dr. Mauchamp.

Fourth.—That the Moroccan authorities expedite the preparations for the application of the reforms agreed upon by the Algerian convention.

Minister of War Gabbas has doubled the night guards here, has disarmed the soldiers belonging to the tribes around Casablanca, and has forbidden the guards on the outskirts of Tangier to allow any European to leave the city.

The French cruisers *Galilee* and *Duchayla* continue to fire on and disperse the Moorish horsemen who approach Casablanca.

Will Organize Police.

Paris, Aug. 8.—The note communicated by the French Government to the signatories of the Algerian convention.

The note also expressly states that a police force for Casablanca and its vicinity will be organized in concert with Spain and adds that any future measures necessitated by the situation will be communicated to the powers.

Official advices estimate the number of Moors killed or wounded during Sunday's bombardment of Casablanca at 300. One French sailor was seriously wounded.

Journalistic Approval.

The newspapers are unanimous in expressing approval of the course pursued at Casablanca and call for special attention to the fact that the native quarter was bombarded with the approval of the military commander.

The Petit Republicain says: Only exemplary punishment can bring the Kabyles to more reason and more humane sentiments. It is sad to think that shells are necessary to convey the message of civilization, but when dealing with barbarians this is the only way.

Forty Years for Burglar.

And Chum Who Gave Evidence Gets Twenty-Five Years.

New York, Aug. 8.—August Van Fahrig, aged 20, convicted leader of a gang of burglars, who terrorized Nassau County residents for nearly six months, was yesterday sent to Sing Sing Prison for a term of forty years at hard labor.

Christian Schlang, aged 19, another member of the gang, who turned state's evidence, was sent down for 25 years, and his mother, for receiving stolen goods, for five years.

Schlang's sweetheart, who gave evidence, will be given her liberty.

Richest Nickel In Canada.

Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., Aug. 8.—J. B. Miller has discovered what is said to be the richest nickel deposit in Canada, near Worthington.

A vein a hundred feet wide and almost pure metal was found.

More Douks Arriving.

Ottawa, Aug. 8.—According to statistics here, there are a good many Doukhobors from Russia among the immigrants who are pouring into Canada.

Many of them deny the general charge that their countrymen have caused trouble in Canada and the Northwest.

New Empire Offices.

Ottawa, Aug. 8.—It is understood that before Lord Strathcona returns to England he will have the approved plans of the Canadian section of the new empire offices, which are to be established in the heart of London.

Sir William Lyne has already arranged for a portion of the Aldwych site on the Strand for Australia.

Shoots Wife, Hangs Self.

New York, Aug. 8.—Vainly seeking a reconciliation with his wife, who had left him, Victor Linde, a young man, fired four shots at her on the roof of his father's home and fled to the cellar of an adjoining house, where he committed suicide by hanging.

Another Mill Burned.

Maxwell, Aug. 8.—The sawmill near this place owned by Irish & Scott was destroyed by fire yesterday, being the second mill burned lately. No insurance.

PRICE OF SCHOOL READERS.

Education Department Unable to Get Reductions In Other Books.

Toronto, Aug. 8.—Hon. Dr. Pyne, Minister of Education, announces that owing to the report of the Text Book Commission having been only recently received, and the fact that several text books on one subject are on the authorized list, the difficulties consequently connected with agreements and copyrights, and the necessity for giving due notice to the trade, the Department has not yet been able to secure what it would consider sufficiently adequate reductions in the prices of the books for use in the schools, except, as has been announced, in the case of the Ontario readers.

These are now obtainable at the new prices, as follows:

First Reader, Part I, five cents.

First Reader, Part II, seven cents.

Second Reader, nine cents.

Third Reader, thirteen cents.

Fourth Reader, fifteen cents.

The publisher selling to any purchaser for use in Ontario shall allow the following discounts:

(a) On one or more copies of any book, 25 per cent. off the prescribed retail price.

(b) On quantities of the value of \$250 and upwards at retail prices (this sum to be made up of any quantity of any or all of the said books, and in any proportion the purchaser may desire), 25 per cent. off the prescribed retail price, and an extra ten per cent. thereafter.

Early in October next, the contents and prices of the list of books now in use in the schools will be revised, and arrangements made for the publication of such text-books as may be required.

GATHERED IN HOME TOWN.

Three Thousand Old Boys Celebrate at Galt.

Galt, Aug. 8.—The success of the home-coming festival and semi-centennial seems assured with its first day, as thousands of visitors were in town yesterday and the streets were gay with decorations.

An immense gathering in Dickson

park yesterday morning witnessed the formal commencement of the celebration.

Hon. James Young, honorary president of the celebration committee, read an address, in which he recalled his own recollections of the memorable 13th of May, 1857, when the foundation-stone of the town hall was laid.

The address was followed by short speeches by Hon. Vice-President His Worship the Mayor, Dr. Adam Thomson; Chairman J. P. Jaffray, Vice-Chairman ex-Mayor Dr. Radford, the clergymen of the town and others.

In the afternoon the ball game attracted 10,000 people. Sports and various entertainments were also in full swing.

FELL INTO FREEZER.

Little Lad, Peering After Ice Cream, Terribly Trapped.

Cressona, Aug. 8.—A child's legs sticking out of an ice cream freezer almost froze the blood of a Cressona, Pa., man. Topped head first in the freezer, full of water, the three-year-old son of M. L. Rule was pulled out after two minutes, apparently dead; but was resuscitated in a remarkable manner.

Wexford Honors Redmond.

Wexford, Ireland, Aug. 8.—The municipality of Wexford yesterday unanimously voted the freedom of the city to John E. Redmond, leader of the Nationalist party in the House of Commons, in recognition of his Parliamentary work for Ireland.

Trolleys Collided.

Rutland, Vt., Aug. 8.—Twelve persons were injured, four seriously, when a well-filled trolley car crashed into an empty car, on the Rutland street railway line, in this city yesterday. The cars met head-on as they rounded a sharp curve.

"Arabian" Ashore.

Cornwall, Aug. 8.—The steamer *Arabian* was driven ashore on the big shoal in Lake St. Francis, opposite Lancaster, yesterday afternoon, and remains there fast, but uninjured.

Tugs have been sent for to haul her off.

Killed at Crossing.

Ashbury Park, N.J., Aug. 8.—Four persons were killed by a passenger flyer on the Pennsylvania Railroad at a crossing in Allentown last night.

LADY GODIVA RIDES

Coventry Clergy Are Shocked and Leave the City.

CROWDS WITNESS PAGEANT

Historic Event Celebrated—Ancient Incident Closely Followed—Legend of Peeping Tom—Actress Personates City's Benefactress In Flashings, and Gauze—Costume Is Much Criticized.

Coventry, Eng., Aug. 8.—Mounted on a white palfrey and decorously clothed in masses of hair, pink flashings and clouds of gauze, a modern Lady Godiva yesterday morning gave a representation of the historic ride through the city streets.

Coventry has been Lady Godiva mad for months. When a revival of the procession, last witnessed in 1857, was first mooted there were many who desired a strict adherence to tradition even to the nudity of Lady Godiva, but the anti-nudists succeeded in effecting a compromise, and a vaudeville actress, whose specialty is to display herself in groups of living statuary, was engaged to represent the historic benefactress of Coventry.

The actress, who is said to have complained that she could make half a dozen summer frocks out of the gauze she was compelled to wear, took an hour and a half to arrange her trailing hair and long draperies, and then a special committee had to approve of her costume before Lady Godiva was permitted to take her place in the pageant. Many of the local clergy who had been preaching against the flashings as being suggestive of nudity left the city temporarily, but most of the people of the country and eighty to one hundred thousand from the outside had a sight of Lady Godiva as she traversed the six miles and of the splendid pageant of which she was the central figure.

The Legend of Coventry.

Lady Godiva, who flourished about the middle of the eleventh century, was the wife of Leofric, Earl of Chester. She was a woman of great beauty and the benefactress of many churches and monasteries. According to the legend, Lady Godiva begged her husband to relieve Coventry of a burdensome tax, and he consented to do so on the condition that she should ride naked through the market place. This she did, covered only by her long hair, and thus won relief for the people. According to some versions of the story the people were commanded to keep within their houses while Lady Godiva passed, and only one man, "Peeping Tom," disobeyed, and he was miraculously stricken with blindness.

Venezuela Will Pay.

Caracas, Venezuela, via Willemstad, Curacao, Aug. 8.—Venezuela advised Belgium last Wednesday, July 31, that in recognition of the principle of arbitration she would pay the disputed claims of Belgian creditors, amounting to \$2,000,000, in conformity with the decision of The Hague's tribunal.

Ottawa, Aug. 8.—The Grey Nuns have offered to supply the vacancies on the teaching staff of the separate school board, made by the departure of the Christian brothers, who will not qualify under the Ontario regulations.






