On her arrival Dr. Watt at once went on board and commenced operations to prevent the disease from spreading.

Although a policy of secrecy has been observed with respect to the vessel, it has been ascertained that she is being thoroughly fumigated. The crew is being innoculated, and if after a certain number of hours there is no spread of the disease the vessel will be declared safe. the vessel will be declared safe.

The Empress of Japan was awaiting the arrival of the overseas mail at Vancouver, but on account of the outbreak she had to leave that port for quarantine. Should the Empress be ready to sail within the next day or two it is understood that the mail will be brought from Vancouver by the Princess Victoria and will be transferred to the Empress as she lies at quarantine.
