The past season has been a good average one for the timber trade of New Brunswick. Last winter's output of logs on the Miramichi proved to be a moderate one, barely sufficient to keep the mills in operation. The output for this season, it is expected, will also be moderate, and manufacturers are maintaining a firm conservative attitude, and as the forest lands of the Province were being overworked, their course justified, and by a continuance of the policy adopted the past two or three years holders of timber limits OHATHAM, N. 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
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
