MONTREAL LONGSHOREMEN OUT ON STRIKE FOR INCREASE

MONTREAL, May 13.—Acting on a demand made to the ship federated some days ago the longshoremen employed on many of the ships controlled by members of the federation quit work at 6 o'clock tonight, having decided not to return until they secure the increased wage for which they ask, thirty cents per hour for day and night work. Tonight only one of the federation boats were men working, the Allan liner Parisian having a couple of gangs at work. Work on the Bonald and Thomson lines was at a standstill. The Canadian Pacific steamship lines are not in the federation, and men were working on all four of that company's boats in port. The full effect of the strike will not be felt until morning. BOY ADMITS BAND OF 5 LOOT TO BUY COCAINE

Atlantic City Police Start Crusade to End Illegal Traffic in Drug.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., May 13.—War to a finish against the vendors of cocaine in the city was ordered this morning by heads of the police department, who started detectives on a general search for information against druggists and those who, they declare, are selling the drug to boys. Special agents will be placed at work on Monday, and quick prosecutions will follow. Not only will the drug stores be watched, but there will be a general search for individual vendors of the drug who, the police believe, are diligently and quietly working in this nefarious business.

City police found five boys in a basement in a lodging house. Weapons, crude burglar tools and a big assortment of articles were found in the place and taken to headquarters by the boys by Detective Appel.

The lads gave their names as Lewis Zeigler, Nicholas Lorraine and Walter Lawrence, of Philadelphia, and Lester Freeman, of Providence, and Mike Smith of Atlantic City. All were held for a hearing, and later taken to Mays Landing jail to await action by the grand jury.

While the police were putting the boys through a "third degree" examination, Lorraine, after securing promise of protection from the police against his companions, admitted that the boys were victims of the cocaine habit, and that they had stolen to procure the drug. He is said to have named a place where the youngsters had been able to secure regular supply of the drug when they had money from their raids. "We took it before we started out to make our heads clear," declared the lad.

Miss Nan Churchill, Miss May Guthrie and Miss Stella Shriner, pretty girls from a Virginia avenue hotel, were witnesses at the hearing and declared that their rooms had been looted of everything of value, including a pocketbook. One of the boys confessed that they had planned to waylay John Morris, an engineer, who passed their place late at night. Instead, one of the boys struck into Morris' room and stole his best trousers, and this put the man on the trail that eventually landed the boys in jail.

When the police discovered that the real cause of the boys' crimes was the desire for cocaine, the matter was dropped.
