LABOR CONGRESS DECIDES THAT NOTHING IN CANADA HAS EVER BEEN DONE PROPERLY

Alien Labor Law Condemned, Lemieux Act Gets a Black Eye, Nova Scotian Gov't Denounced and Whole Management of the Glace Bay Strike Severely Censured--An Enquiry Demanded.

QUEBEC, Que., Sept. 24.—Dramatic resolutions were passed at this morning's session of the Dominion Government to abolish the alien labor law on the ground that it was worthless and useless in its present condition. The Lemieux Act, which was characterized by British Columbia delegates as one of the most mischievous pieces of alleged labor legislation that has ever been adopted in any country. Calling out of the militia at Glace Bay, N.S. was the visit of Hon. Rodolphe, the postmaster general to the Mikado relative to general immigration and alleged agreement was said to be a complete farce, as hordes of coolies and other undesirable were pouring into British Columbia.

TORONTO NEWS CHARGED WITH CONTEMPT OF COURT

Counsel for Mrs. Turner, Indicted for Murder, Begins Action Against Paper.

TORONTO, Sept. 24.—Mr. John Godfrey, of Robinsons, Godfrey and Co., counsel for Mrs. Turner, who is charged with the murder of an infant yesterday, instituted proceedings against the editor of The Toronto News for alleged contempt of court in commenting on this case before trial.

HARBOR BOARD AGAIN DISCUSSING TRANSFER

Agreement With the Government Being Taken Up This Afternoon—Inquiring About Mr. Durant's Company.

The Harbor Board is holding a special meeting this afternoon to give further consideration to the transfer of the West St. John harbor lots to the Government. As there is considerable revision to be done to the agreement it is not likely that any other business will be taken up.

While on his way home from Boston D. C. Clark stopped off at Portland yesterday and was present at the reception tendered Commander Peary by his townsmen. Mr. Clark stated he did not remember ever seeing a greater crowd than that which turned out to greet the explorer. It was crowded, shouting and cheering in this setting of hands of humanity, said Mr. Clark. He shook hands with Peary and extended him the greetings of St. John. The auditorium in which the reception was held was crowded almost to suffocation, several people having to be carried out.

MRS. BESANT LEARNS HER FORMER IDENTITY

Discovers That She Was the Original Hypatia After a Few Centuries She Became Bruno—Filled Several Other Roles, and Will Live Again.

CLEVELAND, O., Sept. 24.—Intimate friends of Mrs. Annie Besant, President of the Theosophical Society of the World, declared here today that their leader had confided to them that she was a reincarnation of Hypatia and Jordano Bruno.

THE LAMP WAS FILLED WITH GASOLENE

Threatened to Explode When Lighted—Ontario Parliament Building Will Be Fireproof.

TORONTO, Sept. 24.—Hon. Col. J. S. Hendrie, chairman of special committee appointed to arrange for the rebuilding of the burned west wing of the parliament buildings, stated tonight that the work would be commenced at once. The wing will be reconstructed on absolutely fire-proof lines, he said.
