Van Buren, Me. \$20,000 Building Destroyed By Fire

The Mack M. Pelletier building on the corner of Main and Bridge streets, was destroyed by fire, early Friday morning with a loss of about \$20,000. The building, one of the familiar landmarks in this section, was occupied by Mr. Pelletier's clothing store, the Gagnon and Vermette Insurance Offices, John B. Pelletier's law office, Louis Simard's shoe repairing shop, and Mr. and Mrs. George Cyr and family. The fire was discovered at five o'clock and was believed to have originated around the furnace. Two general alarms brought out all apparatus of the fire department, and through the quick work of the firefighters, the fire was confined to the interior of the building. The stubborn blaze was finally under control after two hours of fighting. There was a partial insurance on all property.

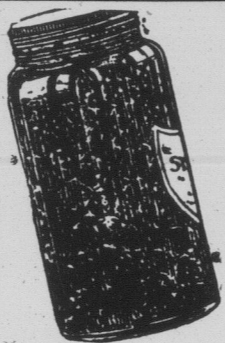
