The official Procurator of Nagasaki is investigating the recent "arrest" of
the American yacht Columbia, owned by J. Harvey Ladew, of the New York
Yacht Club, by the Japanese government. The owner says he received verbal
permission from the Custom House authorities to enter the Port of Nagahama
for repairs. The Japanese government, however, says that it issued a permit
for the Columbia to visit the sacred islet of Miyajima and the maritime town of
Takamatsu, but not Nagahama.

KING HONORS CAPTAIN.
New York, June 24.—It became
known yesterday that King George
had conferred the honorary rank of
commander in the royal navy reserve

 Cunard liner Mauretania. He will

list, but will be senior to naval rates
by his own officers, who are all lieutenants
in the naval reserve. When King
George boards the Mauretania on
July 11 at Liverpool, the Royal
Standard will be hoisted at the main
mast, and Captain Turner and his
officers will wear their cocked hats
and swords, and the crew will be in
naval reserve uniform. Captain Tur-
ner is the first captain not in the
reserve to receive the rank of honorary
commander in twenty years.
