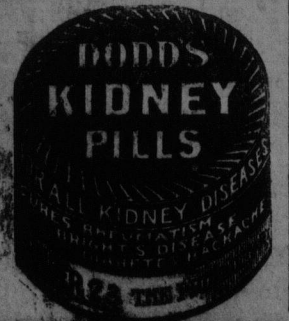

POLICE COURT

Dr. D. C. Malcolm yesterday appear-
ed as an expert witness in the prelimi-

also remanded.

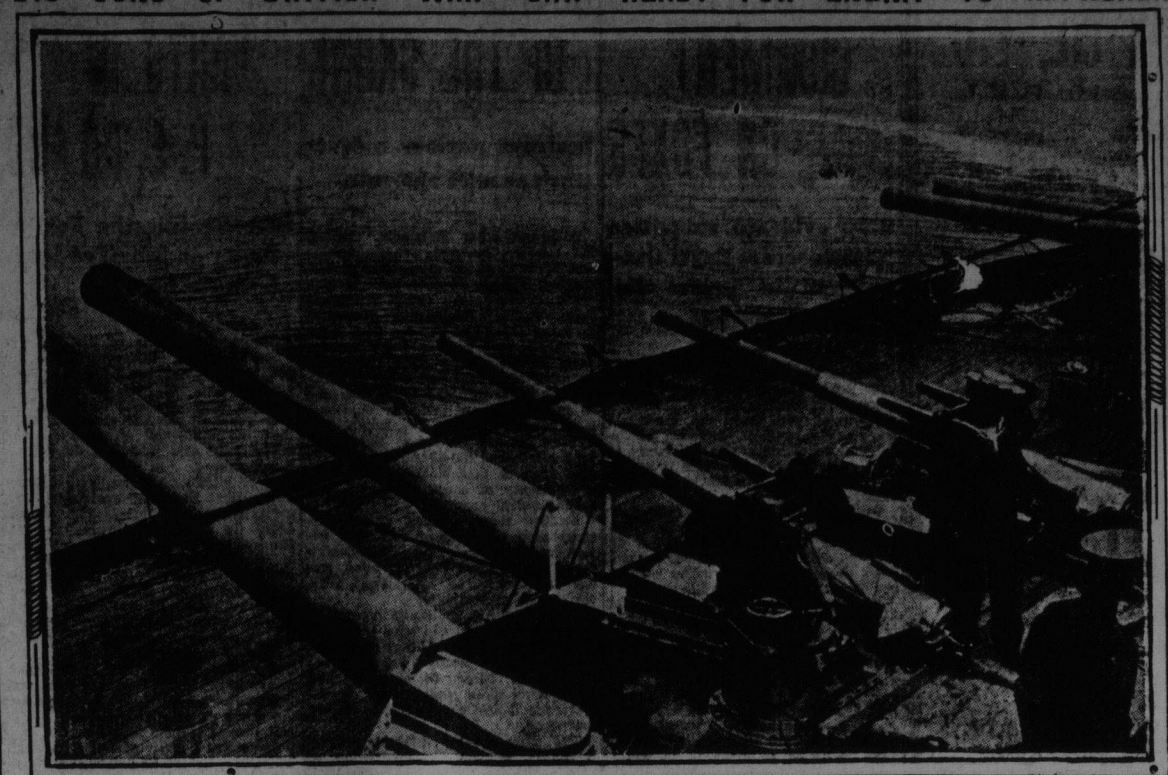

Above is shown the big guns on one of Britain's dreadnoughts now lying in the North Sea ready for an attack by the German fleet. Travellers arriv-

C.P.R. TO INCREASE ORDINARY CAPITAL STOCK BY 75 MILLIONS

None of it to be issued until sanction of shareholders
received at special meeting later — Annual meet-
ing yesterday — Sir Thomas Shaughnessy's ad-
dress contains note of confidence in future of road.

Montreal, Oct. 7.—At the annual
meeting of the shareholders of the Can-
adian Pacific Railway Company to-
day the report of the directors was
unanimously adopted.
Sir Thomas G. Shaughnessy, Sir
Thomas Skinner and John K. L. Ross,
were re-elected directors.
A resolution was unanimously passed
authorizing an increase of ordi-
nary capital stock by an amount of
seventy-five million dollars. This is
done to establish the right of the
company to issue such stock when re-
quired, but no portion of such addi-
tional stock is to be issued until the
sanction of the shareholders is first
obtained at a special meeting called
for the purpose.

In moving the adoption of the an-
nual report, the President, Sir Thomas
Shaughnessy, referred to the depres-
sion in trade and travel during the
last half of the fiscal year, which has
been greater than anticipated, and
the effect on revenue was conse-
quently quite pronounced, but he
pointed out that with the property in
its present splendid physical condi-
tion, and with the facilities for econ-
omical operation that have been
provided substantial reductions in
working expenses were possible, and
a decrease in net revenue more mod-
est than would otherwise have been
expected.

He referred to impossibility under
present conditions of unrest and un-
certainty of forecasting the business
situation, but pointed out that the
crops recently harvested, although
fifteen to twenty per cent. less in vol-
um than a year ago, will yield much
larger returns on account of higher

prices prevailing, purchasing power
being thus improved, which should
have the effect of stimulating west-
bound traffic with favorable influence
on earnings. With peace restored,
immigration from Europe may be ex-
pected to be on a large scale, and Can-
ada should profit very substantially.
Railway mileage that had been in
progress of construction is practically
completed. The only important works
in hand are the tunnel in Selkirk
mountains, passenger and freight ter-
minals at Quebec to be used jointly
to issue in connection with the com-
pleted railway lines and rolling stock,
which money has been advanced from
the treasury. He voiced expression of
deep sympathy of the board with the
sufferers by the loss of the Empress
of Ireland, and referred in conclusion
to the selection of Mr. John K. L.
Ross, of Montreal, to fill the vacancy
resulting from the death of Lord
Strathcona.

A meeting of the board was subse-
quently held and Sir Thomas G.
Shaughnessy re-elected president and
David McNicoll, vice-president of the
company. The executive committee
was appointed as follows:
Richard B. Angus, Herbert S. Holt,
David McNicoll, Sir Edmund R. Osler,
Sir Thomas G. Shaughnessy, Sir Wil-
liam C. VanHorne.

COL. HUGHES SAILED YESTERDAY FOR ENGLAND FROM NEW YORK

Ottawa, Oct. 7.—Hon. J. D. Hazen is
today the War and Naval Minister of
Canada. Col. Sam Hughes sails today
from New York for Europe. He will
hand the Canadian first expeditionary
force over to the British government.
He will go to the battle line in Europe.
He will come back to England for a
consultation with Lord Kitchener up-
on the further training of the first
Canadian expeditionary force, and as
to variations which should be made in
organizing the second Canadian ex-
peditionary force.

The British government has not yet
officially accepted the second offer. This
official acceptance is expected today
or tomorrow. As soon as it comes,
enlistment will be inaugurated. Col.
Hughes will be able to communicate
by cable the suggestions of Lord
Kitchener as to the second expedi-
tionary force from Canada.
