## Saint Monica's Society Meeting

Was Last of the Season—Reports Showed Much Work Accomplished and Plans Made for Future Activities.

The regular monthly meeting of Saint Monica's Society was held in the Knights of Columbus rooms yesterday afternoon, at three-thirty o'clock with Mrs. D. P. Chisholm in the chair. Ordinary routine business received undivided attention, it being the last meeting of the society for this season. The report of Miss Marion Hogan as treasurer of the society showed that all bills of the society had been met, and an amount remained as a nucleus for the next season's activities.

A request of the National War Savings Committee of New Brunswick was received at the meeting asking for the hearty co-operation of its members in the Thrift Stamp Campaign which is being launched on May 25th. Twenty-five members of the association volunteered all possible assistance in this most worthy object.

Relative to the charity workers' report it was shown that two appeals had been offered during the month of April, and that twenty-one garments and seven dresses had been made, coupled with four visits to the Boys Industrial Home.

Miss Kate McDuffigan, as secretary of St. Monica's War Saving Stamp Society, reported that \$45 had been saved through the month of April, and that thirty-six new members had joined the society.

Among donations reported was \$25 to the nurses' home in the East St. John County Hospital for the benefit of these workers of mercy in fitting up their new home. Answering the appeal of the St. Thomas' College directors for funds another \$25 was donated to that most worthy cause to aid in the rebuilding of the college.

Arrangements were completed for a tea and pantry sale in the near future. Arrangements for a fancy booth and table are yet to be made.

St. Monica's Society has closed a most prosperous year and much benefit has resulted as the result of the Christian activities of a number of Catholic ladies of the city. Their work has been from time to time served through the columns of the press, yet it is to be noted, that many other acts of kindness have been done by the society. The society is to be congratulated on its efficient and most praiseworthy work, closing as it does a most prosperous season.

## Y. W. C. A. MEETING.

A special meeting of the Board of Directors of the Y. W. C. A. was held at the Assembly room on King Street yesterday afternoon, the President, Mrs. John A. McAvity presiding. The meeting was in the nature of a preparatory one to the annual meeting, which takes place this month. Plans were made to assist the campaign now being carried on for the Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A. The question of appointing a general secretary came up for discussion, and the work among girls was spoken of, hope being expressed that the summer camp would prove possible. The report of the nominating committee was handed in by Mrs. F. E. Holman, the names being voted for the required period.

## FOURTEEN POINTS AGAIN UNDER THE LIMELIGHT

Germans-Austrian Cabinet at Vienna Criticized Will Action in Approving of London.

Basle, Switzerland, May 5.—German-Austrian cabinet at Vienna issued a manifesto in which it claims that President Wilson, in his making known that he accepted the treaty of London as far as concerned the demarcation of frontier between Italy and Austria, which meant the annexation of the southern Tyrol, had acted in a violation of the faith of his own people.

This ninth point, unlike the eighth, was not so much a change in the treaty as a change in the conclusion of the treaty. The document adds that the Italian claims to the southern Tyrol were founded purely on "straw grounds." These, it holds, do not justify annexation.

## GERMAN REPORTS PICKING FLAWS AT VERSAILLES

Claim They Are Being Persecuted by the French—Are Making Life Miserable for Them.

Berlin, Saturday, May 3.—(D. Associated Press)—Newspapers with the German peace delegation at Versailles are sending general denials of the charges of persecution, but Schumann, the president of the German delegation, declared a trenchant bitter polemic war, does not disguise his feelings at the treatment given the Germans by the French. He devoted the whole of his report today to the "frustration" accorded the German delegation, which he says is reduced to limits.

He tells of a stenographer sought to purchase tooth powder and a "nearly caustic" diplomatic breach" the incident with her expulsion from the Schumann complaints of the prices, especially since the German must be transformed into a cheap business with enemy debt.

## HUNGARIAN SOVIET RETAKE SZOLNOK

London, May 5.—Hungarian forces have recaptured the town of Szolnok, on the Tisza river, from the Roumanians, according to a Hungarian wireless message dated 5 p.m. Budapest. The town is now in the hands of the Hungarians, it is declared.
