NOTES AND NEWS.

NOVA SCOTIA.

At E. Bigelow & Son's steam saw mill, Canning, on Thursday, the large insected tooth circular saw came in contact with a part of the carriage and was broken into a hundred pieces. For a moment there was a perfect shower of teeth and pieces of the saw broken into every conceivable shape. Very fortunately none of the attendants or by-standers, of which there were several, were struck by the pieces.

The E. M. S. Nesteria which arrived at Halifax on Friday afternoon from Liverpool via Queenstown and St. John's, N. F., brought among her passengers the Nova Scotia contingent of the Wimbledon Team. A large number of citizens assembled on the wharf to greet on their return, the men who have wrestled from the competitors of the mother land additional honours for their own country.
