GOVERNMENT BUILDINGS.

It will be gratifying to our readers in this section of the country to know that plans for at Ottawa have been adopted by the Govercompeted. The style of the adopted plan of Department buildings is decorated Gothic .-The Parliament buildings are required to be constructed for a sum not exceeding £75, 000; and the successful architects are confident that their plan can be carried out for that sum. These buildings will be about 500 feet long and of irregular wedth; the central of the seven towers will be 180 feet high, and the body of the building in front about 40 feet, with slanting roofs. The Legislative Halls are placed on each side of the centra court - which is about 100 feet by 70, so the it will afford ample light and air-from which they are separated by corridors. They are on 'he ground floor; and in capacity are each equal to the English House of Lords; 95 feet by 45. The plan adopted is the only on in which the Legislative balls are placedon the ground floor; an advantage so manifest that we may be sure it could not have been overlooked in deciding upon the plans. There are no rooms above the Legislative halls: and from the plan of lighting there could have been none. The panelled roof admits light during the day; which is in addition to that supplied by the side windows; and and et peculiar soft kind which will render the chapge from day to night almost imperceptible.

The Reporters' gallery is placed behind the Speaker's chair; and may be of any required dimensions. A separate entrance is provided for the Peporters, as for the Governor General; and an apartment is provided for them in which to write out their notes. The library building is of circular shape and situated in the rear of the main building; from which it is partially detached, as much as it can be said to be when connected by one story instead of two. It is on the plan of the new library of the British Museum; and is fire proof. It will be capable of holding some 300,000 volumes. Between the central balls and the central court there is a corridor, a members' lobby at the end, and another corridor on the other side. Beyond this, and parallel with the Legislative halls, are wardrobes, water closets, etc. There is a small court in the centre of each wing; the rooms around which will serve for committees, clerks, and other needful purpose At the further end of the central court is a room for His Excellence the Governor General. The post office and telegraph office are placed near the main entrance, over which rises the central tower, and under which carriages may be driven. The member's entrance is on a direct line with the outer corridors, which enclose the Legislative dors to the front. The emoking rooms are in the back part of the buildings; in the one storied part that leads from the main building to the library.

The disposition of space on the second story is precisely the same as in the first though, as already remarked, that portion of the building which forms the Legislative halls, and that which forms the connecting link of the main building with the library are only one story high. It is intended to place the buildings of the bank of the river which is some 150 feet high; and from which they will present an imposing appearance. "We find a most remarkable difference in the proportion of spring and fall wheat sown in different districts. I some, such as Perth, North Wellington, and the counties along the Samia line of Railway, very little but spring wheat is grown, perhaps nine-tenths as much as fall wheat; in others, such as Dumfries, parts of Oxford, and all the southers counties, the proportion is just the other way Every where, however, it seems—and we are glad to hear it—the farmers are paying attention less and less exclusively to fall wheat. From Bronte we learn that "there will be still less fall wheat sown this fall." Around Bothwell we are told "the farmers are evidently turning their attention more to Spring crops, and stock raising," and similar repordame from fitty other places. Where fall wheat is sown, the necessity of using the earliest kind is generally felt. The Milton people say "the weevil (midge) made an attempt to destroy the wheat here, but the skin became so hard before the insect got sufficient strength, that it failed." The London opinion is "I think we should urge upon the tarmers to persevere in sowing the Mediterranean fall wheat, for although it suffered most from the frost, it should be remembered that such frosts are unusual and that wheat would have completely escaned the milds.

That is, the cost of keg, treight, charges and commission, together with loss in weight, will together come to an average of at least 2 cents a pound, and sometimes more. This should be taken into consideration in purchasing. This market is cleared of all good shipping parcels that could be had at 13½ cents and under, but we have not heard of more being paid for fixins. We stated some time ago, that Dairy Butter, in tubs, was scarce; and as tittle has arrived since, the demand for retailing qualities is very active. Good Tub Butter, in neat, clean packages, would bring 15 to 16 cents to day. A sale of a shipping parcel, rather out of condition on account of lying for about two months, was made yesterday at 13½ cents.

Pork has advanced about a do'lar a-barrel in New York, and the price of mess here has been affected to nearly a similar extent. Mess is held at \$17, but it is difficult to give precise quotations. Cut Meats, in consequence of their liability to spoil, are pressed on the market. The highest we can quote for Canvassed Hams is 10 to 10½ cents, and Shoulders 7 to 7½c cents,
