Among the statements complained of were that the minister believed that Mr. Fry was associated in a liquor group which met at the Victoria Hotel. The notice, which was signed yesterday, stated that unless a retraction was made before 6 o'clock last night, and that full publicity be given to the same, otherwise a suit for slander would be instituted.


