

## GOOD TEMPLARS LODGE ENTERTAINS THE CHILDREN

A Large Number of Children Accept the Invitation And are Present in Berquist's Small Hall On Monday Evening To Enjoy the Good Things Provided

The invitation which was issued by the members of the I. O. G. T. lodge, was accepted by a large number of the children, who met in the Berquist's small hall on Monday evening last.

The object of the lodge was to give the children a treat which would be different from the usual Christmas tree and concert style of party, and so it was decided that this affair should be carried on along the lines of a tea party, somewhat common to English children.

Tea was served at 5 o'clock to nearly thirty children and at 6 o'clock the older people enjoyed their supper in comfort, though one could scarcely add "peace and quietness," for the children were just beginning to give vent to their excited feelings. When the tables were cleared away such games as 'musical chairs' and 'stirring the porridge' were played by everybody. Of course each one wanted to be 'tipped' with the porridge spoon and excitement waxed high until the signal for order was given. It was noticed with pleasure that the children quickly settled down to quietness and listened with admirable attention to the impromptu programme which was given by a number of the girls and boys. After several songs and recitations had

been given, Mrs. Simister, superintendent of juvenile work, in a few words explained the meaning of the letters "I. O. G. T.—International Order of Good Templars," and the main object of the order. She also explained that it was possible to have a junior lodge, the work of which is to be carried on by the children themselves. The promise which must be made by members of such an organization was read and explained and a list made of the names of those who would wish to join. Twenty-five names were given in, and, when the consent of the parents of these children has been obtained, will be entered on the membership roll. A meeting of these twenty-five and any others who wish to add their names to the list, will be held next Monday afternoon, January 5th, at 4.30 p.m. when the idea of the organization will be carefully explained.

During the evening, by the kindness of some of the brothers of the lodge, fruit, nuts and candies were handed around amongst the guests. At the close of the evening those who so strenuously and successfully worked to give the children a happy time were quite well satisfied that every one had thoroughly enjoyed his or her little self.

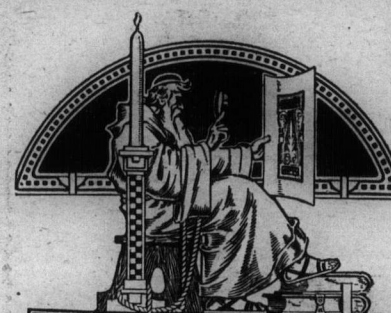
