Happenings of Republic Condensed For Busy Canadian Readers.

Platinum is now quoted at \$150 an ounce, a new high price.

A 60-year-old woman at Altoona, Pa., cut 173 acres of corn in 17 days.

Bishop J. Garrigan, 79, head of the Catholic See of Sioux City, Ia., is elected.

The fossil of a giant 32 feet 19 inches in height is reported discovered near Vera Cruz, Mexico.

In a contest conducted by the

Essex County, Mass., School Farm, 250 hens laid 36,052 eggs in 49 weeks.

A Michigan man, charged with allowing a fire he started on his farm to spread to a Government forest was fined \$298.

Stricken with paralysis at Mandan, N.D., A. Brooks, 72, confessed he murdered his wife in Columbus O., 25 years ago.

A Michigan doctor shot his valuable dog in mistake for a snake in addition he was fined \$225 for hunting out of season.

There are about 750 different kinds of rodents in the U.S. and the annual loss they cause to crops is

estimated at \$50,000,000.

Executive of principal railway systems are meeting in New York to discuss need for higher rates when the lines are returned to owners.

Race for Republican nomination for U.S. President has narrowed down to General Wood, Governor Lowden, Senator Watson and Senator Johnson.

Laws to govern foreigners are an immediate necessity, declared Senator Kenyon on his return to Washington from the Pittsburgh steel strike district.

Alleging his wife concealed from him before the wedding that she was in poor health, a New York man asks to have the marriage annulled on the ground of fraud.

Two belligerent cats started hostilities under a standing milk wagon in Brooklyn. The horse ran away and crashed through a plate glass window, \$200 damage.

Inclusion in the permanent railroad legislation of a provision to penalize strikes of railroad employees was decided, 14 to 1, by the U.S. Senate Interstate Commerce Committee.

Women are barred from visiting Camden, N.J., shipbuilding plant, employing 20,000 men. Officials claim when a woman walks through there is cessation of work, the men watching her.

and reputed discoverer of the North Pole, says a western company, in which he is interested, has struck oil and is in a fair way to make many millions.

A plan for swift, sure justice for food and rent profiteers, under legislation, soon to become effective, was mapped out at a conference of U.S. administration leaders led by Attorney General Palmer.

A 10-year-old boy at Syracuse, N.Y., riding a child's coaster, was injured when struck by an auto. The lad's father is suing for \$10,000, claiming the coaster is a vehicle and entitled to protection under traffic rules.

## SHANTUNG AWARD UPHELD BY SENATE

Fourteen Republicans Swung Over to the Pro-Treaty Forces.

Washington, Oct. 16.—The long debated Shantung amendment to the peace treaty, presented by Senator Lodge and approved by the Foreign Relations Committee, proposing to hand over to China instead of Japan the former German territory, finally was rejected in the Senate to-day with a majority of an even score against it.

In the vote of 35 to 55, fourteen Republicans swung over to the pro-treaty forces, while three Democrats lined up with those supporting the proposal. Of the six senators absent, two Republicans were put on record as in favor of the amendment and one Republican and three Democrats as opposing it. The roll-call, which came at the end of another six and a half hour sharp debate, in reality swept away

six amendments instead of each change in the treaty text. It had been numbered separately by the committee in its decision to strike out the word "Japan" and substitute the word "China" throughout the sections relating to the Province of Shantung. By unanimous consent, however, the six changes were debated and voted on as one.

Only three of the committee's 45 amendments now remain to be acted on by the Senate, 36 previously having been rejected. Of those remaining one relates to American representation on the Reparation Commission and two to equalization of voting power in the League of Nations assembly.

After the vote was completed Senator Lodge announced that later he would move to strike out entirely the sections awarding the Shantung rights to Japan. Notice also was given by a number of the Republican senators who opposed the committee amendment that they would present reservations dissenting from the Shantung award.

The general prediction was that a vote on the remaining amendments would not be reached before the middle of next week.

## BULGARIA NEXT

Every Indication That Pact Will Be Disposed of Shortly.

Paris, Oct. 16.—The Bulgarian delegation is now on its way back to Paris, and there is every indication that the Bulgarian treaty will be disposed of shortly. Only the Hungarian treaty explains to be negotiated by the Peace Conference as it is generally agreed that it will be impossible to hold the Supreme Council together for the Turkish treaty.

There is yet no government in Hungary with which the Peace Conference can deal, but the treaty draft is practically completed in Paris and should there be no recognized government in Budapest before December 1, arrangements will probably be made to have a few delegates remain in Paris to negotiate a treaty with Hungary whenever a satisfactory government is established in Budapest.

The Supreme Council and the Peace Conference will probably not end officially until the Hungarian treaty is concluded, but only a few members representing the various Governments will remain to complete the work. An entirely new set of delegates will probably be selected to negotiate the treaty with Turkey, when the allied and associated powers learn whether the United States will accept a mandate for Turkey or a part thereof, and are able to agree upon the disposition of the Turkish territory.

## FRUIT FARMER IS KILLED INSTANTLY

Team Starting, Wheels of Wagon Pass Over G. Gilliland's Chest

COBBOURG, Oct. 16.—Word has been received here that George Gilliland, a former resident of Haldimand township, was accidentally killed at Yorkton, Sask. While he was unloading some boxes of fruit his team started and he was thrown down in front of the vehicle. The wheels passing over his chest and neck, he was instantly killed. He leaves a wife, formerly Miss Minnie Sherrin, a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Anthony Sherrin, Haldimand, and two children. He is also survived by six brothers: William, James, John, Fred, and Thomas, in the West, and Richard, in Haldimand.
