The matter remains undecided but we are still hopeful that some satisfactory solution will be found. The Government is, of course, anxious not to prejudice the position, one way or the other or to do anything which would make a satisfactory solution more difficult.

In the circumstances, the Government has
felt that there could be no advantage in a Canadian
representative making a formal appearance before the
Deputies, presenting his submission without the
privilege of discussion, and then withdrawing.

At the same time the Canadian Government wishes to give
all practicable assistance to the Special Deputies
in their work, without prejudice to any representations
it might desire to make at a later date. To this end
certain preliminary views on the settlement with
Germany have been prepared. In the belief that these
preliminary views may be of interest, the High Commissioner
in London has been instructed to communicate them tonight
to the Chairman of the Special Deputies.
