Air Mail

Dear Mr. Shaffer:

Thanks for yours of September 3rd, 1948, re your appointment to Aiyansh, Naas River, B. C.

This village is located some 80 miles up the Naas River. The climate is not too severe. Generally there are two cold snaps in the winter but they seldom last more than a few days, though the thermometer drops to about 30° below zero in some years. If you have good woollen underwear and a heavy overcoat, ordinary warm clothes will be sufficient otherwise. You should have a pair of hip gum boots as these are necessary on the river at all times.

Re food. You can get all canned foods at the village store (Indian but quite good), also tobacco. You can buy vegetables locally on arrival at Aiyansh. I would suggestthat you buy basic supplies such as tea, coffee, sugar, corn flakes, rolled oats, canned butter, peanut butter and such canned goods as meats, vegetables, soups, etc. and ship them in 15 lb. parcels by parcel post. The may seem expensive but the reason is this: besides the freight from Vancouver to the mouth of the Naas, you will have to pay 5¢ a 1b. freight on all goods up the river except mail which is carried by the mail contractor to the post office at Aiyansh. If you brought at David Spencers or Woodwards Ltd. in Vancouver, they would make up your shipments in this way and you would have no further trouble but that of collecting your parcels at the Aiyansh Post Office. Your best time to go in is on the steamer connecting with the mail contractor at Kincolith. On this boat the fare up is only a few dollars; otherwise you would have to hire a boat and it would cost \$60.00 or more. have asked Mr. Davey to check the mail boats at the Vancouver Post Office.

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
