LANCASTER'S BILL LOST.

Commons Railway Committee Declined to Limit the Speed of Trains Ottawa, Feb. 24.—The Railway Com-mittee had under consideration yes-terday Mr. Lancaster's bill, which proterday Mr. Lancaster's bill, which provides that the speed of trains at level, crossings, in thickly settled portions of cities, towns and villages, shall not exceed ten miles an hour, unless proper safeguards in the way of gates and watchmen are provided. Speaking in behalf of the bill, Mr. Lancaster said that all he wanted was enforcement of the sail he wanted was enforcement of

behalf of the bill, Mr. Lancaster said that all he wanted was enforcement of a law which was on the statute book since 1867.

Mr. F. H. Chrysler, who appeared for the Railway Company, held that the existing law was sufficient to meet all cases. He said that the bill was unnecessary and mischievous. About 2,000 crossings would be affected. The cost would be \$1,000 a crossing, or \$2,-900,000 in all.

Patterson was taken into custody. He is a bachelor and has a large amount of stock on the premises. He wished to plead guilty to the offence, and offered Floody \$100 for the fine, but the officer refused, saying he would ay the matter before the Inland Revenue Department.

Protest Against Pense.

Kingston, Reb. 24.—Yesterday a protest was entered in the office of the Registrar of the High Court of Justice against the return of E. J. B. Pense, as member of the Ontario Legislature. There are ten pages of closely-written foolscap, in which many charges of bribery and corruption are alleged. The disqualification of the member is asked. Donald Mointyre, the defeated candidate, is the petitioner.
