very sensible Satisfaction in giving my Assent to any Proposal which may, with Propriety, either reduce the public Expences, or increase the Revenues, and reinstate the Credit of the Funds.

But as the only Method you propose, is by reducing the Salaries of the Officers of Government, already not more than sufficient: And as this Reduction amounts to a Tax; and in the Proportion you propose, very considerable, I must observe to you, Gentlemen, what I am persuaded did not appear to you, that this amounts to a partial Tax, and therefore unjustifiable; as no Reason can be given that the Officers of Government only should bear more than a Proportion with all others. And I must further remark to you, that this Tax becomes more partial, heavy, and therefore more unjustifiable, as the Officers of Government are paid in Province Notes at their nominal Value, whilst every other Person is at Liberty to take them on such Terms, as they shall judge most to their own Interest.

'I am very fensible, Gentlemen, of the Difficulties which may occur on this Occasion, in the present Circumstances of the Province, and it will make me very happy, when proper Means shall be offered to extricate you from them; but it is my Duty to attend to the Support of Government, so particularly necessary at this Time in America; and to use my utmost Endeavours, that the public Supplies may be sufficient, for that Purpose, to which they ought first to be applied.

I must therefore, Gentlemen, recommend to you, the Consideration of this Matter once more, and that you will at the same Time, think of some sufficient Provifion for the Justices of the several Inferior Courts of Law in this Province.
