During the winter and spring 189 cases of smallpox had been reported from the Colville reservation, with seventeen deaths. Of these no fewer than 102 cases have developed in the last four weeks. The Spokane fleatth authorities had no means of ascertaining how many cases actually existed, but to quote Dr. Newman, "the woods are full of smallpox."
